

Pelicans Smothered In 17 To 3 Game; Will Go On Road For Next Two Weeks

Brookings Pelicans just didn't have it, either offensively or defensively, Sunday, as the Bandon Millers gave them a real trouncing by a 17 to 3 score in a Southwestern Oregon league game at the local field.

The Millers, second place team in league standings, hopped on starting pitcher Bob Astin for four runs in the first inning on two hits, two walks and three Pelican errors. The visitors added two more counters in the third on a walk, and two hits, also another three runs on three walks and two hits in the sixth.

The Bandon batters added insult to injury by scoring eight un-needed runs in the top of the ninth. Three straight hits drove Bob Astin from the mound with two runs already across the plate. George Yamor came in from centerfield to try his left arm but could not stop Bandon surge. Three walks, a hit batsman, two base hits and the final two Brookings errors for six more runs ended Yamor's hurling chore. Big Hank Westbrook stopped the slaughter by retiring the last two batters.

Considering the 16 Bandon hits plus 11 bases on balls, the score would have been even larger except for some excellent fielding by the Pelicans from the second through the eighth innings. Bob Astin with a splendid move and throw to first erased two of the runners he had walked.

While the Pelicans touched Bailey Brem, OSC pitching ace, for nine hits, they could bring only three runners across the plate. In the second Bill McLean doubled and George Yamor followed with a long home run to right center. In the eighth Keith Johnson walked with two down and Bunky Peterson drove him in with a two-base hit. The Pelicans loaded the bases on two singles and a hit batsman in the fourth with none down, but Brem tightened and retired Astin, Mc-

Lean and Yamor in order.

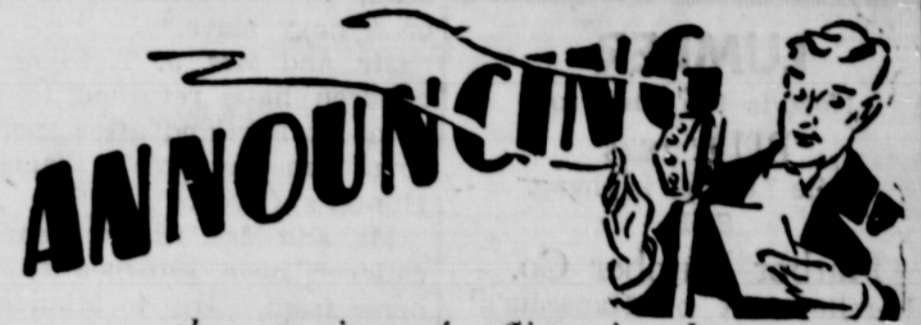
Mrs. Eugene Ackley, Mrs. Ruth Bathiany, Mrs. Clara Kerns, Mrs.
