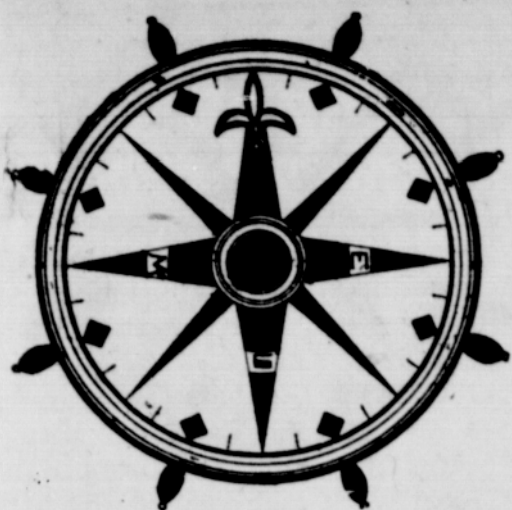
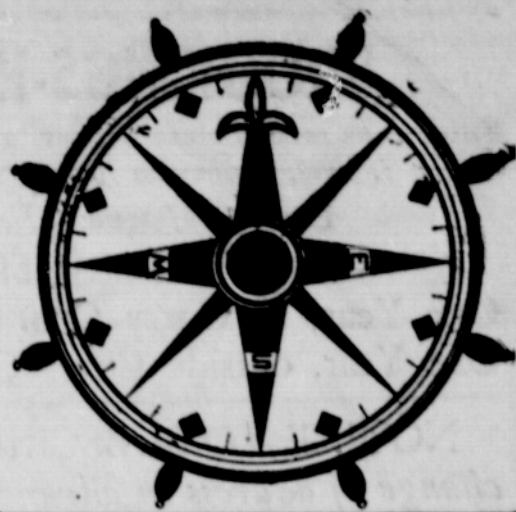

Hanscams Suffer Smoke 'Damage' Early Monday

The Harbor store, owned by E. E. Hanscam & Sons, nearly suffered a devastating fire Sunday morning, when a can of floor oil, put on the stove to heat, boiled over onto the hot stove while no one was in the building. It was only by heroic measures that the can was removed.

Planning to oil the floors, the Pilot was told, Vernon went to the store to prepare for the work and decided to get a bite of breakfast. When he returned the flames were shooting to the ceiling and the smoke was so thick that it was impossible to see more than a few feet.

The can of burning oil was slid from the stove onto a scoop, and carried out. This week the entire crew is busy cleaning up the stock and fixtures, coated by a microscopic film of oil smoke, difficult to remove.

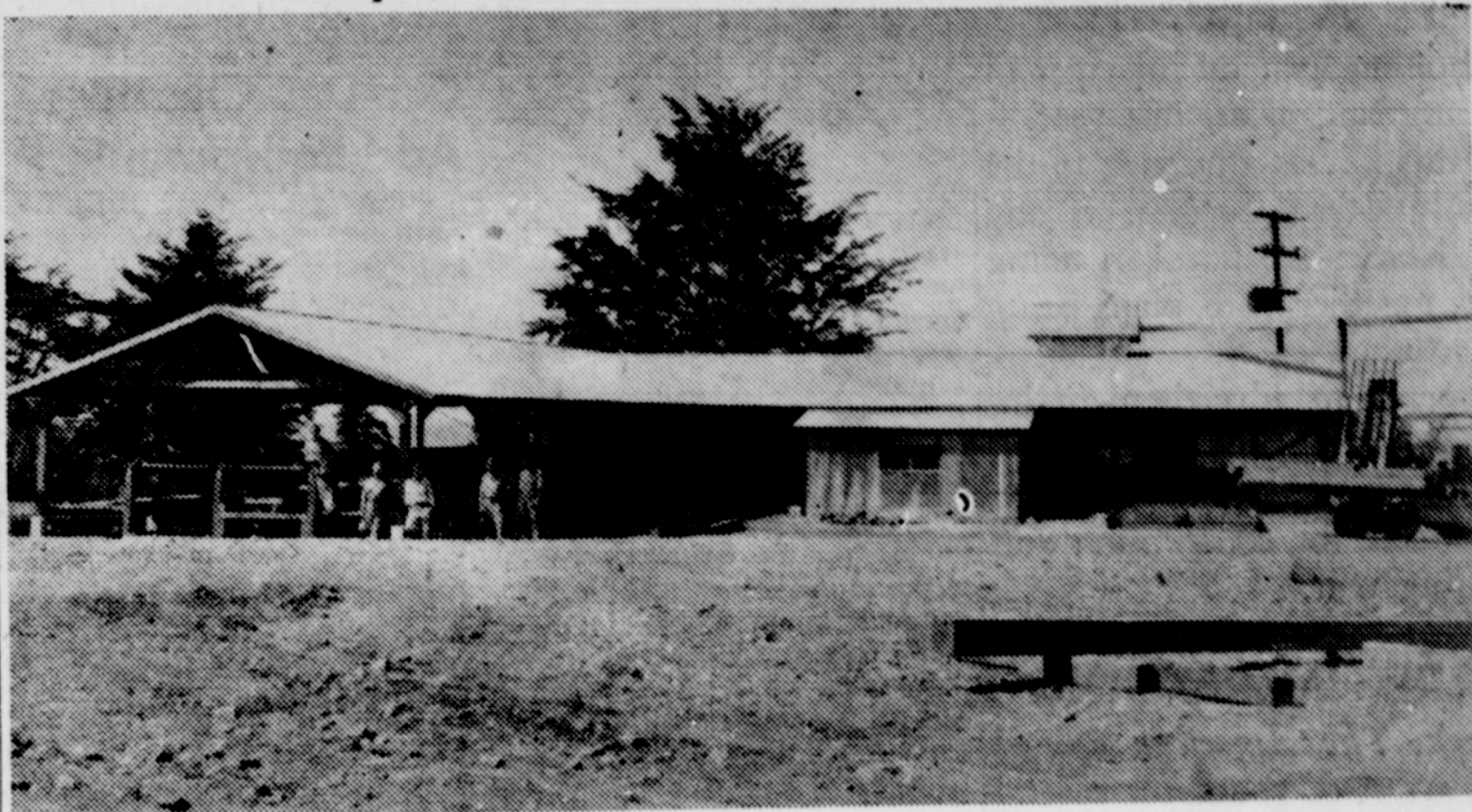

Ex-Dist. Governor Spoke To Rotary

"What Makes Rotary Tick," was the topic of a talk by Chas. Cooley, ex-district governor, of Grants Pass, now international director of Rotary International, Tuesday noon at the Chetco Inn.

"You are favored to be a member of this organization," he said in way of opening his talk, "and you must remember that in 83 countries where over 7500 clubs function, you have men in the same thought processes as you exercise. These men are the leaders in their fields, and are usually found lending a hand to every thing of civic betterment.

"I am one of 14 men, from all zones of Rotary who meet three times a year to help decide the problems which Rotary has laid at its doorstep. We are of many different languages, but we are of more or less a single thought—that of promoting good will and friendship all over the entire globe.

"Rotary recognizes all creeds, races, colors, and peoples, so long as these people are striving to promote friendship and better relations. One trip to a Rotary International convention will be of 30 heating clinics held this year in the Coleman Heating Institute.

BPA Opened Bids On Construction

Bonneville Power Administration opened bids this week on the 24-mile Bandon-Port Orford and the 27-mile Port Orford-Gold Beach section of the 115 kv transmission lines for service to Curry County. The following bids were read at the opening:

Montgomery Electric Co., of Portland: Schedule 1, \$188,191; Schedule 2, \$291,173; total \$479,364. A. S. Chulman, Los Angeles: Schedule 1, \$193,856; Schedule 2, \$279,791, total, \$473,647; M. A. Pithoud, Cancoover, Wash., Schedule 1, \$201,298, Schedule 2, \$289,883, total \$491,181. These are under study.

Home Building To Begin Immediately All Over 'Vicinity'

The coming of about 300 more families to the Brookings vicinity within the next six months to a year has added impetus to the home building program of the area. One needs but glance in any direction to see a home under construction, and perhaps at the very side of one of these another foundation is in the process of completion.

New subdivisions about the area are being opened to prospective home owners, with these subdivision undergoing leveling and grading work.

Four contractors of the vicinity are going at top speed to try to keep abreast with demands for homes. Building material places of the area report unprecedented sales in lumber and materials to go into homes.

Talk about town, especially by those who have sufficient land on which to build, is to either sell the lots or to build a place for rental. This source of home is still indefinite and cannot be depended upon by any who seek a place to live.

Ellsworth On Tour To Europe Now

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Special to the Pilot)—Three times during my time of service in Congress I have made trips to Europe. Once, during the height of the European War in Sept. 1944, at my own expense, and twice later on official business, with the congressional committees, said Harris Ellsworth in a letter.

"I feel that these trips have been of extreme value to me in my work as a representative in congress. Whether we like it or not, we are deeply concerned with the affairs of Europe. Congress is faced almost constantly, it seems to me, with decisions regarding our policies and our activities there. I have learned a lot on the previous trips but I have always felt a bit dissatisfied. I felt if I could have more time, could look around and visit with the people in my own way, I could fill in some gaps—could get rid of some question-marks which have been in my mind regarding things over there."

"The foregoing is by way of giving the business background reasons for my decision to go to Europe again at my own expense—this time Mrs. Ellsworth will go with me and we will spend some time just looking, talking and learning. I am convinced that time spent that way during the next several weeks will be much better spent than in simply sitting here in Washington, waiting for the tag-ends of this session of congress to be completed."
