

Pelicans Spot Myrtle Creek Five Runs; But Win Sunday's Game, 17 to 6 Score

Apparently as a good neighbor gesture, the Pelicans "spotted" Myrtle Creek with five runs in the first inning, Sunday, at Myrtle Creek, and then lashed out a total of 19 hits, including two home runs, three triples and two two-baggers, in trouncing the Myrtle Creek nine by a 17 to 6 score. After the first inning Krug was miserly to his hosts, allowing but three hits.

With Coquille and Roseburg both being defeated by one-run margins, the Pelican win will enable Brookings to gain undisputed possession of fourth place in Southwestern Oregon League standings.

Myrtle Creek started out with a rush by scoring five runs in first. Al Kruk, just signed with the Pelicans, was making his first start since his last pitching chore for Bandon on July 4. Two walks, two singles and a home run by Dale Ulam accounted for the big Myrtle Creek inning.

Bill McLean and George Yamor both singled to start the Brookings first but a double play ruined any scoring chance. Keith Johnson's home run in the second with Hal Sowers aboard finally started the Pelican scoring. A lone tally was added in the third by DeAutremont and Matson.

The Pelicans tied the score with two runs in the fourth and went into a 9 to 5 lead with four in the sixth. The big Brookings inning was the eighth when seven runs crossed the plate, highlighted by Kruk's second triple and DeAutremont's home run.

Al Kruk was rough on the Myrtle Creek batters after his shaky start and doled out only two scratch singles until Arlan Weaver tagged him for a home run in the ninth. Kruk, a former Far West League hurler, with Pittsburgh and Eugene, proved his experience by handling eight assists in flawless fashion. He also refuted the saying that "all pitchers can't hit" by crashing a double and two triples in his five trips to the plate.

The Brookings score sheet revealed Manager Whitey Matson

with five singles in five official times at bat but a comparison with the Myrtle Creek "official" scorer after the game showed only four, one "hit" being charged as an error on the Myrtle Creek first baseman. To quote Whitey: "I was robbed."

The Pelicans make another haul by going to Roseburg next Sunday and are determined to avenge their previous 12 to 7 defeat at the hands of the Chiefs. A win is a "must" if the Pelicans are to hang onto fourth place.

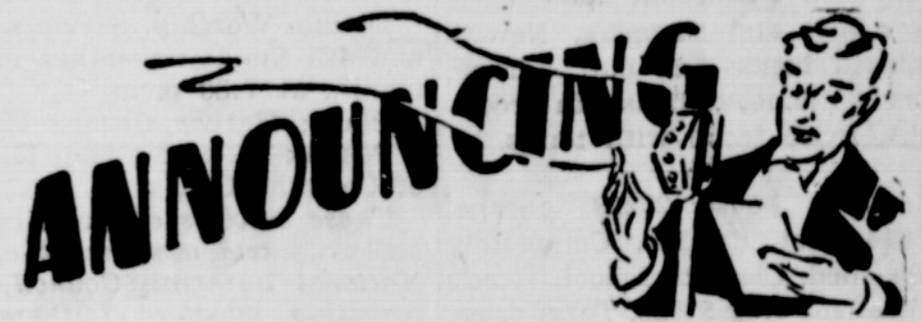
