

ROSEBURG CHIEFS BLANK PELICANS

It took the Roseburg Chiefs exactly an hour and thirty-five minutes to reel off a five-to-nothing victory over the Brookings Pelicans in a Southwestern Oregon league game in the valley town Sunday.

Bus Sporer, on the mound for the Chiefs, was in rare form, allowing only six hits, scattered over as many innings. He struck out nine Pels and issued only one walk. Sporer's shut-out was in danger in only the first innings as Bill McLean got his first of three hits by pickling the opening pitch of the game for a triple to left center. Keith Johnson's apparent base hit off Sporer's glove turned out to be a fielder's choice as shortstop

Winders retrieved the ball and fired home to nail McLean as he tried to score. Manager Whitey Matson ended the threat by hitting into a very close double play.

Al Kruk, on the hill for Brookings, retired the side in the first and second, allowed an unearned run in the third on Mel Friend's error and again shut out the Chiefs in the fourth. Roseburg, however, put the game on the proverbial ice with a three-run burst in the fifth, which was Kruk's only bad inning. Lovell Baker led off with a tap over the bag at third which went for a hit and Hal Zurcher made it wto on with a ground ball through the box. John Linde then scored both with a two-ply swat to left center, the only extra base hit for the Chiefs. Catcher Ritchey's grounder to right,

after two down, put Linde over the pate. Roseburg scored the final tally in the sixth, an unearned run after two outs.

The Brookings loss along with Coquille's 3 to 2 12th inning win over Bandon toppled the Pels into a tie for fifth place and dimmed the hopes for a Brookings spot in the post-season series between the first four teams.

Brookings plays host to the Medford Studs next Sunday afternoon. This will be the first home appearance for the Pelicans who travel to North Bend on August 26 for their last game of the scheduled season.

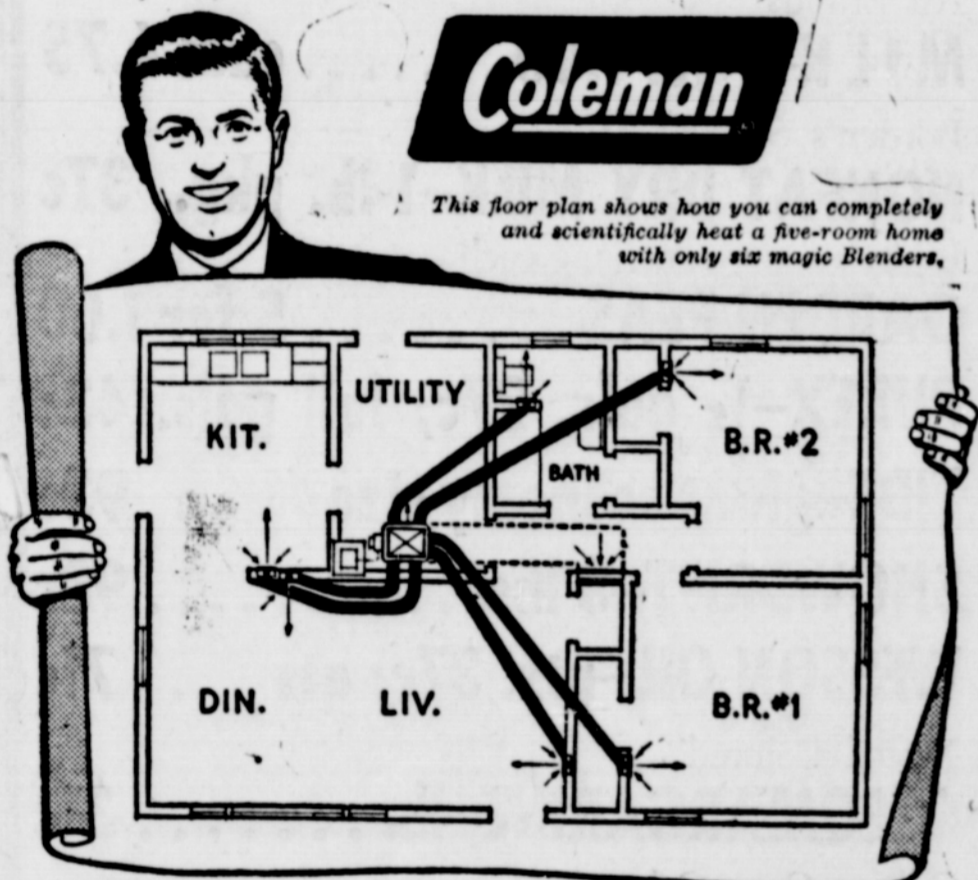
