Rotary Club Meets Earl Foster of Foster-Clyde Lumber Company of Gold Beach was Wednesday noon luncheon speaker of the Rotary club. Since the western division of U. S. Army Engineers submitted their "not convinced" report in February on the Rogue River project, Mr. Foster has headed the Rogue River Harbor Improvement Association. The efforts of Mr. Fos-

ter's committee of representatives of various local organizations were realized with the announcement this week in Washington, D.C., of the approval of a \$3,750,000 improvement project in the Rogue River harbor at Gold Beach. Mr. Foster traced the three years of work by many local citizens in pushing this project to its present state. The services of Judge Kendal and of Mr. Guerny, engineer, were secured for the presentation of the case at the June 5th hearing in Washington. The only expenses of the harbor committee was the fees for Judge Kendal and Mr. Guerny and stationery. Mr. Foster reported that there still remains more money to be collected and he urged our need for keeping up our interest and help with more funds. Rotarians were told of the oral testimony given by Mr. Foster at the Washington hearing. He stated that the Army engineers and their economic advisers were attentive and interested in what was said. The board was convinced by a showing of definite figures of savings over the present costs of transportation of lumber. The next step is authorization of the money by Congress.
