O. C. A. Gains New Members

Oregon Coast Association Recording Secretary Charles Grayshel of Brookings reports seven new OCA members in Brookings and two renewals of membership in the association. A coast wide drive for Oregon Coast Association members to strengthen the membership of the organization and to provide funds to print additional literature to supply the ever increasing demand for coast information by the traveling public is being spearheaded by Association President W. F. Badley of Otter Rock. President Badley reports 75,000 Oregon coast travel guides printed and distributed already this year with a heavy demand from all travel agencies, auto clubs and chambers throughout the United States and several foreign countries for coast literature to distribute to persons planning trips to this area. Randall Motor Club of Los Angeles reports "we are making up logs covering the Oregon coast at a rate of 85 per week, compared with an average figure of 58 last year."

President Badley stressing the need for new members said, "Everyone benefits from the tourist dollar and all should support the work of the association which is so successfully attracting the lucrative tourist business to the coast area. Membership is the life blood of the organization and open to all. The Oregon Coast Association relies on the funds from membership fees, to cover its operational costs, advertising and distribution of coast travel literature. Everyone receives additional cash benefits from the tourist trade. A stronger organization with additional man power and funds will mean a larger program of advertising and promotion. OCA Manager Verne Tinnerstet in Brookings Saturday, August 11, on business in connection with the work of the association, reported traffic on Hwy 101 at the Cal.-Ore. line up 26.4% over last year for the first seven months of this year. "Traffic at this point showed a 16.3% increase for the month of July above July 1950," he said. Mr. Tinnerstet was on his way south, into northern California, to distribute additional Oregon coast literature to businesses catering to the traveling public to be

passed on by them to the tourists.

"This increase in traffic," Mr. Tinnerstet said, "will aid in our demands for an improved highway and bring the time nearer when the highway commission's proposed improvements will take place."

The Oregon Coast Association, instrumental in bringing about the building of our coast highway and improvements thereon, must bolster its membership to strengthen its appeals for highway improvements to take care of new industries and an ever-increasing tourist travel using this highway.

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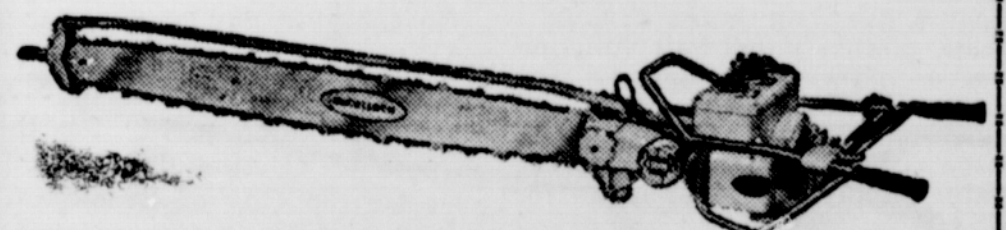
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
