

Medford Blanks Pelicans, Sun.

Paul Gehrman, crafty pitching ace of Medford's Cheney Studs, was at his best unday afternoon as he blanked the Pelicans with two hits and his mates went on to win by a 4 to 0 score.

Brookings had only one scoring chance and that in the first inning. Bill McLean, first up against Gehrman, blasted a drive across the road in left that looked like a home run. A fast relay, however, caught him at

the place. McLean got a triple for his effort but fans blamed poor coaching for the loss of the run. The other hit off Gehrman came in the eighth. Bunky Peterson with one down blooped a single into right field but a fast double play wiped out the side.

Wally Maciel pitched a very creditable game. The Studs tapped him for a run in the first as George Gitzen opened with a single, advanced to second on Alex McDonald's sacrifice and scored on Clarence Mellbye's hard drive through the box. Maciel then pitched shutout ball to the seventh when the Studs broke through for their second run on a walk, a sacrifice and Alex McDonald's third hit of the game.

Medford scored the final two tallies in the eighth. Don Fawcett, first up, got a "gift" home run as his apparent single to right took a bad hop, eluded Hank Westbrook and rolled under a car. John Gitzen popped out to Jim Nierman at first but Terry Maddox walked and scored

on Dinty Cox's triple to left. Gehrman and George Gitzen both flied out to end the inning, ninth by retiring the Studs in order.

The Peis, while suffering their second successive shutout, played fine ball defensively and escaped the error column on the score sheet.

Brookings, now all but eliminated from the post-season play-offs, closes the regular playing season by traveling to North Bend next Sunday to meet the strong Lumber Jacks, currently tied with Medford for the league lead.

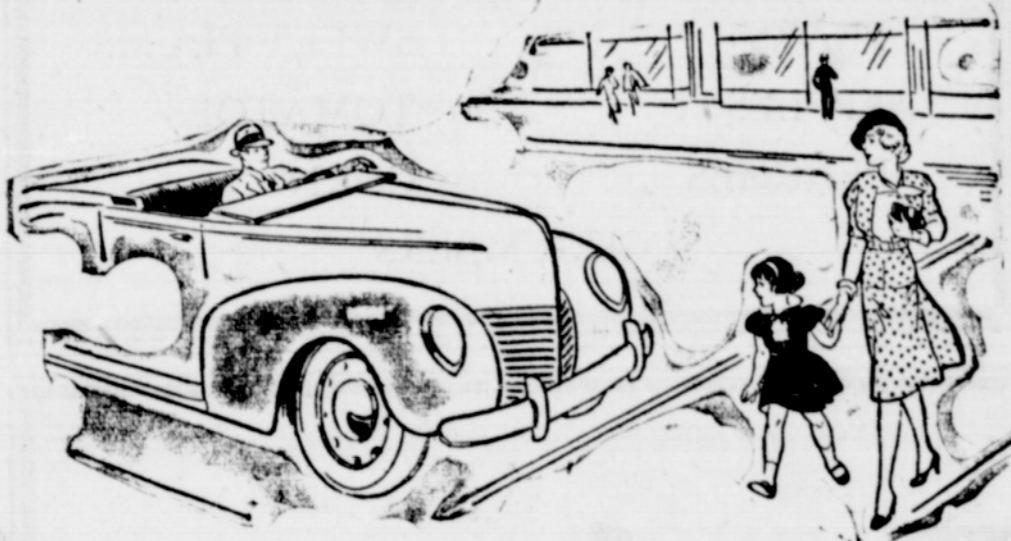
