

**In The Mail-box:**

Editor, The Pilot:

Last June, 16-year-old Lozella Sternberg, daughter of Mrs. Stanley Carr, became the fourth victim of tragedy in the Carr family when a gasoline lantern exploded and she suffered third degree burns over a considerable portion of her body.

Since then, Lozella has been in eside hospital in Crescent City. Recently her doctors, Dr. Bertrand Vipond and Dr. Donald Miller, attempted to do some skin grafting but the attempt was not successful. Therefore, the doctors feel that Lozella should be moved to a large hospital and put under the care of a specialist. Her doctors says she has third degree burns over her arms, legs and about twenty per cent of her body surface. In addition she is now partly deformed by the burns and will need corrective surgery later on for this condition.

Crippled Children's Division of the University of Oregon Medical School will take over this girl's care as soon as the necessary skin grafting has been accomplished and will provide this corrective surgery and plastic surgery to completely rehabilitate her. That agency will not assume her care now since they do not accept acute, emergency cases of this type.

Several organizations in the county have expressed interest in this girl's predicament and indicated a willingness to help out in meeting her problem. The veterans' organizations in Brookings are considering the possibility of sponsoring a benefit dance for the girl, and a number of personal contributions have already been made. The girl's family is unable to meet the cost of the medical care she so desperately needs.

It is probably that Lozella would have to be sent to Portland or some other large city by air ambulance to get the care she needs. The air ambulance would cost about \$100. One month's hospital care in a large Portland hospital would cost at least \$500. Unless a specialist can be found who will donate her services, the doctor's fees will be in addition to these amounts. At least a month to six weeks will be needed to complete the skin grafting that Lozella needs and it may take longer.

If the people of Curry county will see the girl through the next month or two, the Crippled Children's division will take care of her after that. If Lozella gets the care she needs she will probably come through the experience with no worse result than the memory of months of suffering. But she needs help and needs it now. I am sure the people of Curry county will not fail any child who needs help so desperately.

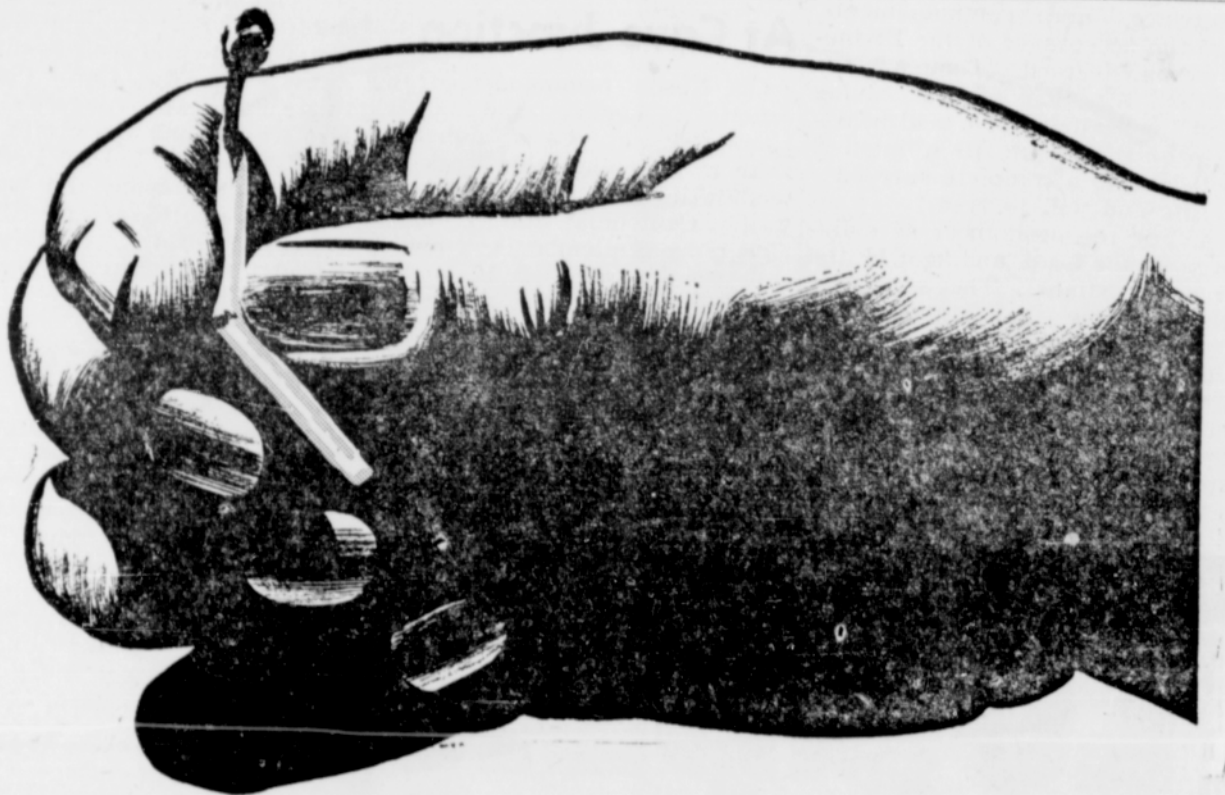
