

Legion Confab Opens Sept. 11

SEASIDE, Ore. (Special) — Members of the American Legion will converge on this beach resort city next week for the 33rd annual convention, American Legion, Department of Oregon, and the annual sessions of the American Legion Auxiliary, the Forty et Eight and the Eight et Forty, which are organizations within the American Legion and its auxiliary. The sessions will open on September 11 and continue until late on September 16. Arrangements for entertaining thousands of veterans and members of their families have been made by a convention commission of members of Seaside Post No. 99, which will be host for the sessions.

Opening the convention on September 11 will be the one-day sessions of the Eight et Forty and on September 12 for the Forty et Eight. Registration for the American Legion sessions will start on September 11 and continue through the 15th. There will be a public memorial service beginning at 9 a.m. on September 13. Rev. George H. Swift, department chaplain, Salem, will give an address: "Lest We Forget."

At the joint opening session to follow immediately, Governor Douglas McKay and Lewis Gough, Pasadena, Calif., national vice commander of the American Legion, will share the honors, each being scheduled for an address.

Business sessions will begin at 1:30 p.m. Thursday and continue throughout Friday and Saturday morning, with election and installation of officers scheduled for the final session on Saturday. Saturday night will be seminar on subversive activities and Sunday morning a meeting of the executive committee. The final event on the program will be a clam chowder feed at 2

p.m. Sunday, to be served by the Seaside Post No. 99, American Legion.

Events of interest to the public will include the Forty et Eight parade to be held at 5 p.m. Wednesday, September 12. The big convention parade will be held at 4:30 p.m. Friday, the 14, and at 8 p.m. on Friday the department drum and bugle contest will be held.

The principal entertainment event will be the department commanders' and presidents' banquet, scheduled for the Gearhart Hotel at 8 p.m. Thursday 13. Donald R. Wilson, of West Virginia, leading candidate for national commander is expected to address the banquet.

Clyde Dickey, Portland, will preside over the American Legion sessions as department commander.

Mrs. Myrtle Kreuger, The Dalles, state president of the American Legion Auxiliary, will preside over the auxiliary sessions.

Walter Kirk, Portland, is grand chef de gare of the Grand Voiture de Oregon, Forty et Eight; and Le Chapeau departmental Oregon Departmental La Boutique Des Huit Chapeaux et Quarante Femmes is Gretchen Robbins of Junction City, Ore.
