The community booth put on at the Curry County Fair last week by Chetco Grange attracted a great deal of attention as it had as the main center of attraction a scale model of the Brookings Plywood plant. The machines had been modeled to size and were numbered so that one could follow the route that the logs will take through the mill to the finished plywood.

Mack Carton of the Brookings Plywood Company assembled the display.

The industries for this part of the county brought out in the booth were lumbering, bulb raising, custom canning by the Cedar Lane Cannery, leather work from Youngs, and rubrum and Easter lily blossoms from the Woodriff Gardens. These, of course, were backed by the canned foods and garden produce from several local families, all arranged against a background of aluminum foil and moss.

As the exhibits this year were not released until 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon, more people were able to see them and the manager of the fair, Kenneth Thompson, is to be commended on the improvements shown in the fair this year.

The Chetco Wranglers took a prominent part in the shows put on for the fair crowds and were in the parades each day. With their blue shirts all alike they made a colorful and attractive group.

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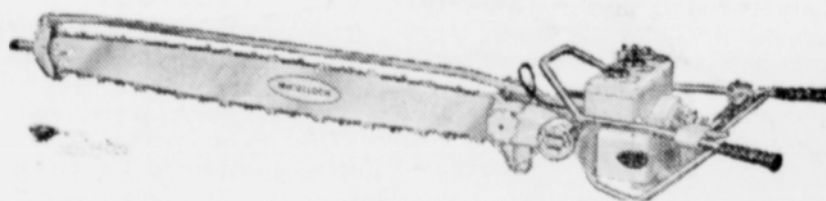
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
