

### Pomona Grange Plans For Grange Conference

At the meeting of the Curry county Pomona Grange at Ophir last Saturday, plans were made to entertain the officers of the State Grange when they come to Curry county for the Grange conference which is planned for October 23 at the Ophir Grange hall. A simple lunch will be served at noon with a dinner in the evening. These conferences, which are schools of instruction, are held in each county of the state once in two years, and bring several of the state officers and state committee chairmen into closer touch with the membership throughout the state.

Fred Adams reported that a state legislature interim committee would soon bring out a report on the fish problem in the state, and in his opinion Curry county

would be much better off with its rivers under the fish commission, than under the game commission as it now is.

Vernon Kolen, county chairman for the "Crusade for Freedom," spoke on that subject, and told of what is being done in Europe to get the news through the Iron Curtain to the people in the Communist-held countries. He stated that there are two radio stations combatting the propaganda being sent out by Russia, and the drive this year is to raise \$3,500,000 to build two more radio stations to cover territory that is not reached at the present time. Monday, September 17, has been set aside as a special day to secure memberships, and women in each community in the county will have charge of both on that day to recruit members for the crusade. Mrs. R. E. Erickson, publicity chairman, also spoke on the subject.

The meeting, which was presided over by the worthy master, Henry Adolphsen, was the first Pomona meeting to be held in the main hall of the new Ophir Grange. The next meeting, which will be on November 10, will be held at Chetco Grange hall, and will be the election of officers, which hold office for two years in the Pomona Grange.

### Weed Control Meet Held Last Friday

Clifford Jenkikns, county extension agent, conducted a meeting on weed control at the Grange hall last Friday evening. He brought out the menace that tansy is in this area, and urged everyone to destroy this weed wherever found on his land. The only way it can be destroyed at this time of the year, is to pull the heads off and burn them, as there is enough strength left in the stalk to finish developing the seeds if they are merely pulled and thrown on the ground. This weed is poisonous to cattle, and while a person may not have any cattle of his own, it is necessary that each land owner kill the weed as it develops on his place, in order to keep it from spreading to the land of another person who does have cattle. It was brought out that one seed head has enough seeds in it when ripe to infest a half an acre of land. One of the oldest residents in the community, Aunt Sue Benham, can be seen on her property busily destroying this weed, and if an eighty-year-old lady can keep the weed down on her land, it should make the rest of the landowners ashamed to admit they can't.

Tansy is classed as one of the noxious weeds in Curry county, and to keep it from becoming the menace that it will in a few years if not kept down, it may be necessary to destroy the weed wherever found at the expnse of th county, to be assessed to the property owners which require this action.
