

Veteran Suicide Mentally Ill; Was Good Cat Skinner

E. G. Powell, who committed suicide last week by shooting himself, had a war background, according to C. W. Means, who investigated and reported to the Pilot. Powell was a veteran in the South Pacific, was on Guam and many other campaigns. He had spent some time in mental hospitals while still in the service.

The Anderson Logging firm reports that he was one of the best cat skimmers they had ever hired. Only on rare occasions did Powell show any tendencies to shock brought on by his war experiences.

Refunds Due On Some Telephones

Subscribers in the exchanges affected will receive on their September bills, a credit on back charges for local exchange service to compensate for delay and reduction in quality service during the period of the recent strike, according to a telephone call from George McBride, district manager for West Coast Telephone Co.

"This will apply only in our manually-operated exchanges," explained Mr. McBride, "as our local exchange service was not effected in the automatically-operated dial exchanges. These credits have been worked out for each exchange affected."

"A generous credit has been given, based on our estimates of the amount of traffic that was delayed and also of the reduction in service quality."

Forest Supervisor Is Promoted

Promotion of Laurence G. Jolley, supervisor of the Rogue River national forest to assistant regional forester in charge of the division of information and education, has been announced by regional forester J. Herbert Stone of the U. S. forest service.

A native of Washington state, the new I&E chief was graduated from the University of Washington in 1933 with a B. S. degree in forestry. He began work with the forest service as a fire guard and field assistant on the Olympic national forest. For four years he was assigned to the regional office division of information and education, receiving an appointment as assistant conservationist in 1939.

In 1940, Jolley was transferred to the Colville forest where he worked as an assistant ranger until his promotion to district

ranger in charge of the Quilcene district, Olympic forest, was announced in 1942. Two years later he became fire control staff officer on the Chelan forest and in 1946 was further promoted to assistant supervisor on the Rogue river forest at Medford.

Jolley, who takes over his new duties in the Portland regional office October 1, replaces Merle S. Lowden who was transferred recently to the Milwaukee regional office of the forest service. Jolley is a member of the Society of American Foresters, Alpha Delta Sigma (professional advertising fraternity), the Masonic lodge and the Medford, Oregon, Rotary club.
