Oregon Leads In Yield Of Five Canning Crops

Oregon soils that pioneers risked their lives to reach in covered-wagon days are still among the most fertile in the country.

The Beaver State's rich earth gives greater yields of five major canning crops than the average for all other states in the nation. The 1950 yield per acre in Oregon was greater than the national average for peas, snap beans, beets, sweet corn and cucumbers, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture figures.

The abundant yields of these five crops are so far beyond the needs of Oregon consumers that the canning and processing industry which packs and ships them to distant markets is second in importance in the state, points out the American Can Company whose agronomy service works closely with farmers and canners to develop better cultivation methods and improve the quality of vegetables. Lumbering ranks as the state's most important manufacturing industry.

Beaver State canners and freezers last year packed more than 99 per cent of Oregon's total commercial production of the five major vegetables, the company explained.

For two crops—snap beans and beets—Oregon is far and away the national champion. Last year Oregon's average was 7.9 tons of snap beans per acre. The national average was 2.18 tons per acre; the nearest rival, California, had a 6.1-ton average. Oregon's production of beets last year totaled 11.6 tons per acre. The national average for beets was 8.91 tons; New York, in second place, had a flat 11-ton average.

Oregon's average of 2,100 pounds of shelled peas per acre last year compared with the national average of 2,075; the state's cucumber yield was 105 bushels per acre contrasted with the national figure of 67; for sweet corn Oregon's yield was 3.7 tons per acre while the average for all states was 2.87 tons.

The state has maintained its predominant position for those crops almost every year since 1939, a can company analysis of Department of Agriculture figures reveals.

Mrs. Nettie Rothacker of Carmel, Calif., is visiting her daughter, Mrs. Robert E. Smith, and husband, Dr. Smith.

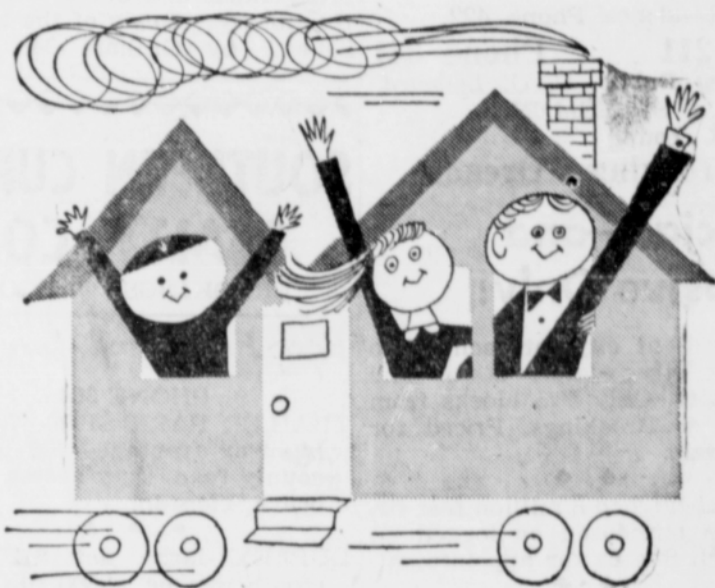
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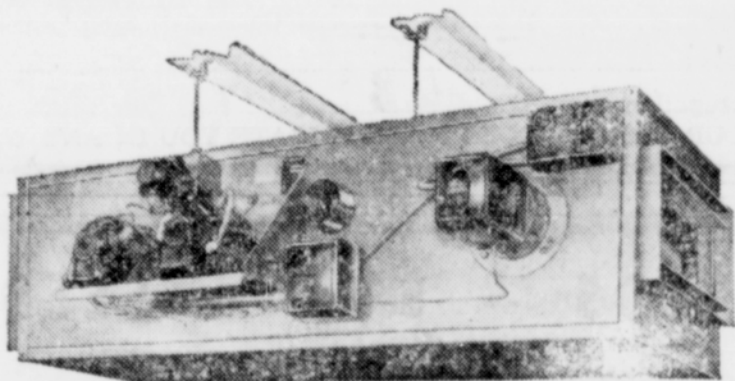


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
