**The Week In Washington, D. C.**

Deficit spending and gigantic

debt are not all of the financial

troubles of our great federal gov-

ernment—although they certainly

represent trouble enough. A fur-

ther really big headache has been

caused by the fact that this con-

gress has not been able as yet

to tell seven of our government

departments how much money

they can spend during this fiscal

year—and the year is already

nearly one-third gone (fiscal year

end June 30).

At the time of writing this the

appropriations bills for the civil

functions of the army engineers

—rivers and harbors and flood

control—and for the legislative,

state, justice, commerce, judi-

ciary and defense departments of

the government have not become

law.

This failure of congress to do

its ordinary duty on time is not

only wasteful, but it is inexcus-

able. Waste and inefficiency re-

sult from the fact that the de-

partment heads are unable to

make precise plans for making

the best use of the money ap-

propriated for them. They just

rock along at their rate of spend-

ing last year and cannot settle

down efficiently until they know

what their financial score is.

With the possible exception of

the big defense department ap-

propriation bill, which is more

complicated than usual, congress

—and that means the majority

leaders including the chairmen of

the appropriations committees of

the house and senate—has no ex-

cuse for this delay. The president

sent his budget up to congress on

time but this congress has just

been fiddling with it for nearly

ten months. Nor has this session

been too pre-occupied with other

legislation. Only five major leg-

islative bills have become laws

thus far this session.

This may turn out to be almost the longest continuous session of congress in our whole history. It is nearing the end. As usual, last minute frantic efforts are being made to get bills to the floor and passed. However, the rules committee, of which I am a member, will have no more meetings and not send any more bills to the floor. Such new legislation as may be considered will be handled under the procedure known as "suspension of the rules." When a bill is brought up under suspension, a two-thirds favorable vote is required to pass it.

Back in June the house passed a tax bill. The president requested some ten billions in new taxes. The house dredged up provisions for \$7.2 billions. The senate rewrote the bill and passed its ver-

sion on Sept. 28, calling for \$5.4 billions, or nearly two billions less than in the original house bill. House and senate conferees have been adjusting their differences for several days. As finally agreed upon by the conferees, the bill provides for tax revenues about 15 per cent above the highest for any year during World War 2.
