Turn Layers Into Payers!

If you own a laying flock that comes from good breeding stock, you have a right to expect profitable results. But your layers will not produce good results unless you, their manager, provide the right kind of feed, good housing, good sanitation, and good care to keep them healthy and productive.

With today's birds, capable of long production records, it is more or less up to the raiser to keep the flock performing well. Thru good management a raiser can contribute greatly to the overall production record of his birds. He can guide them to the production and profitability which can be rightfully expected from good stock.

Intensity—Persistence.

Birds which come from good stock have what is called high intensity and long persistence. Intensity may be defined as the number of eggs the birds lay in one cycle without missing. In some flocks, hens have been known to lay more than 200 eggs in that

many days before missing a day. Persistence, on the other hand, means the ability of the hen to continue to lay eggs through the full calendar year or longer. Today, the best hens may lay from 15 to 18 months, and sometimes longer, without interrupting production for more than just a few days at a time.

A raiser must exercise careful management to get the most out of his layers. In doing this, there are many details he must consider. As a brief reminder, or refresher, here are some of the more important ones:

Management Rules—

1. House birds in a tightly constructed, yet well ventilated house. Have enough windows for good light in the house.
2. Provide ample floor space (not less than 3 sq. ft. for each Leghorn, and not less than 4 sq. ft. for each dual-purpose bird.
3. Provide general sanitary conditions for birds. Clean and disinfect equipment regularly.
4. Use good feed and provide a balanced mixture. Use hoppers to keep feed clean, fresh, and palatable.
5. Provide plenty of clean nesting space.
