

### Lutherans Observe Protestant Start

When Martin Luther, a sincere and devout Catholic monk, professor, and priest, at the University of Wittenberg, Saxony, Germany, nailed his now famous 95 sentences or theses to the church door on Oct. 31, 1517, challenging all comers to debate publicly with him on the basis of Scripture, certain questions regarding indulgences and man's eternal salvation and thus mildly protesting against certain false doctrines and superstitions in the established church at the time, he unwittingly ushered in the Great Reformation of the Church.

Hence the 31st of October has ever been regarded as the birthday of the protestant church, and in particular of the Lutheran.

Luther insisted that in matters of churchly doctrine and practice God's Word alone, the Bible, and not the opinions of men nor the traditions of the fathers, should be the source. In observance of this birthday festival, the Brookings Evangelical Lutheran Mission, "The Church of the Lutheran Hour," will have a special service Sunday, Oct. 28, at 7:30 p. m. at St. Timothy's Episcopal church, opposite the Brookings school. The pastor, the Rev. W. O. Grunow, will preach on the Second Thessalonians, 2:1-17. His theme is: "St. Paul's Prophecy of the Great Anti-Christ." All are cordially invited to come.

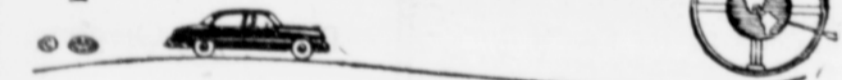

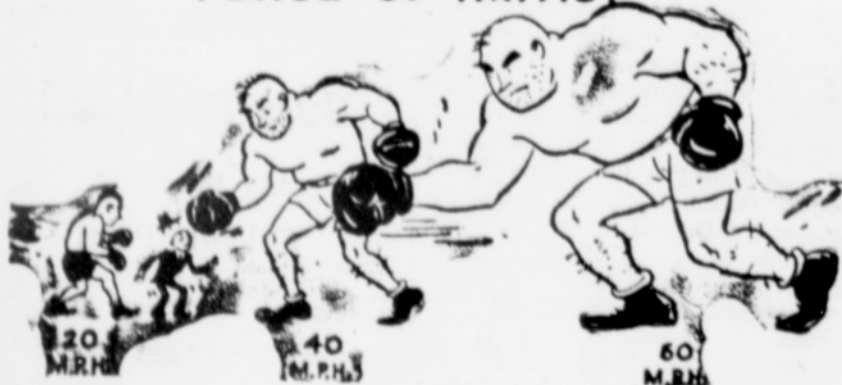
