

Fall Festival Set For November 9

Everyone is invited to a Fall Festival, Friday, Nov. 9, at Chetco Grange hall, for the benefit of the Chetco Community library, at which time will be bazaars, clowns, games, and many other attractions including dancing to Dave Crockett's band. Money collected will be put in to the library funds.

The library was pioneered by the Harbor Community club in 1945 and was opened to the public on June 13, 1947, in a room in the Central building, offered by Charles Echols, with books loaned from the Smith River library. At first the library opened for one hour per week with one librarian, but gradually the number of books issued was soon increased that it became necessary to open twice a week with an assistant librarian.

Successively the library has been housed in the Central building, Hotel Brookings and in the V. F. W. hall where it is located today. Library hours are from 3 to 5 p. m. Tuesday and Fridays.

The history of the library is a story of a community project. Books were donated, money has been given, and many people have devoted much time and energy

November 1 Date Promised In Phone Case For Service Betterment In District

West Coast Telephone Company, at its recent rate hearing at Salem made promises of having new equipment in Brookings about Nov. 1, thus to expand the service of the area. Attorney Samuel A. Hall, appearing for subscribers in this area, exacted this proviso in the minutes of the hearing, which request was commented upon by the public utilities commissioner as urgent.

Service in this community has been anything but desirable. Delays of uncalled for length have been reported on long distance calls. In addition to this kind of service, it is no uncommon occurrence for many of the area lines to be "dead" for as long as a week at a time.

Representatives from this area intimated at the Salem hearing that unless service was made better, the area "would be forced to resort to any alternative in its power."

The little library has steered a perilous course and has come a long way, but it still has a long way to go to achieve its goal of a modern up-to-date library, adequate to serve a progressive community. The library needs two things: sufficient supply of books and a permanent home. Funds derived from the Fall Festival will be used for these purposes.

One of the attractions of the festival will be a rummage sale. If anyone has any articles they wish to donate, they may leave them at the Chetco Store, Brookings, or at Hanscam's, Harbor, not later than Wednesday, Nov. 7.

Dispute Cleared In License Ordinance

About a dozen business men, whose interpretation of the license ordinance seemed to be discriminatory, appeared before the city council Tuesday, with Elmer Parker acting as spokesman. He asked that Ordinance No. 6 be rescinded, and suggested that he would see about sentiment of the chamber of commerce.

When the ordinance was discussed in its entirety, there was no doubt in their minds that no intent was evident on the part of the council to make the license fee out of order or discriminatory. License fees were based entirely upon the principal business of a concern. If the title was "variety store" then the license would be only for a variety store with none of the other entering into the license fee rating.

When explained and shown the budget from which the council originally drafted the ordinance, all left, thanking the council for their courtesy and explanation.
