

Forest Monies Are High For This Year

More than 6½ million dollars will be distributed to Oregon and Washington county governments as their share in national forest receipts for fiscal year 1951, ending June 30. Estimates of amounts to be paid counties have just been released by Regional Forester J. Herber Stone, U. S. Forest Service, Portland.

An increase of almost 100 per cent over last year is indicated in the total sum to be paid counties in each of the two states. Oregon counties will receive approximately \$4,291,000 and Washington, about \$2,248,000, setting new records for both states. Distribution will be made through state officials.

In Oregon, Lane and Douglas counties again head the list with \$728,500 and \$527,500, respectively, earmarked for their use. Lake county ranks third with \$332,000. Leading Washington counties this year are Jefferson, Skamania and Clallam with \$357,200, \$309,200 and \$259,900 in that order. All figures are close approximations.

Every year, 25 per cent of each national forest's total earnings is divided among the counties in which the forest lies. The division is made in proportion to the percentage of national forest land within each county. All money received by the counties from this source is used for schools and roads.
