ISRAELI PIANIST WILL OPEN SEASON CONCERT SERIES, THURSDAY, NOV. 15

Menahem Pressler, the brilliant young Israeli pianist who the American critics have hailed as the "poet of the piano," will open the local Community concert series by appearing on the November 15, schedule at Crescent-Elk grammar school, Crescent City, at 8:15 p. m.



Menahem Pressler, pianist, appears in the Community Concert series, No. 15. This season he plays almost seventy concerts and is being hailed as a "phenomenal young pianist."

Since flying from Tel-Aviv to San Francisco in August, 1946, to win the the Debussy prize in an International Piano Contest, young Pressler has gone far. He has played four consecutive seasons with the Philadelphia Orchestra, two seasons with the New York Philharmonic Symphony, Indianapolis Symphony and San Antonio Symphony, as well as with other major orchestras including Washington National Symphony, the Cleveland Orchestra and the Buffalo Philharmonic.

Born in Badgeburg, Dec. 16, 1928, the pianist was only ten when his family fled from Hitler-Germany to freedom in Palestine. Pressler's adopted country, where he studied and first revealed his talent as a pianist.

His career was well started at home one way in 1946 he picked up an American musical journal and read that a \$1000 Debussy prize was to be awarded at San Francisco's first international music contest in September. He flew to America, took the train across the country, and arrived one day before the contest.

En route he buried himself in the music of Debussy, a good part of which he had never heard before. There were 65 contestants—the distinguished jury included Darius Milhaud and Roger Sessions. Seventeen-year-old Pressler was unanimously chosen the winner.

Popular Student Victim of Accident Saturday Evening

Lyndel Fadling was instantly killed, last Saturday afternoon, and Carla Whitlock and her sister are in the Seaside hospital in quite serious condition as result of a car accident near Hiouchi Bridge. Reports say that in his attempt to pass a logging truck, Lindel ran head-on into another vehicle.

While many details are sketchy the reports claim that Lindel was evidently killed instantly, as his side of the car was practically shorn off.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist Community church, at 2:00 p. m. Wednesday, with Rev. John L. Mumbower officiating. Interment was at William James Ward Memorial Park.

Born at Beebe, Wash., Dec. 13, 1933, he was son of Luke Fadling, prominent lumberman of this area. The family moved to this area in 1946, and Lindel was a member of the senior class at the local high school, where he is a popular student and athlete.

Survivors include, beside his father, Luke Fadling, are: sister, Joanne, brothers, Dennis, Frank and Richard of Brookings, grandfathers, Lee Fadling of Manson and Ed Kaylor of Entiat.

New City Recorder Sought By Council

With Charley Grayshel accepting the presidency of Oregon Coast Association, a position of importance which is likely to take him out of town considerable, he has resigned as city recorder, according to Robert O. Dimmick, mayor.

The city council, by this move on Grayshel's part, is now seeking a new recorder to fill in immediately, as the city must collect its license fees within the next week.

Traffic Ordinance Enacted Tues. At Council Meet.

Ordinance No. 10, to be known as Brookings Traffic code, was enacted Tuesday night by the city council at its regular meeting, and made immediately effective. This ordinance embraces about 40 sections of Oregon traffic codes by reference, and about 20 provisions especially applicable to Brookings.

Several weeks study have gone into this ordinance by the council, which studied practically all codes of every Oregon city.

From the Pine Cone theatre to Hendricks Furniture, diagonal parking will be permitted, but at all other places on Chetco Ave., there will be parallel parking, in keeping with the highway commission's policy. Lack of parking space caused the council to enact this.

Double parking is taboo in all streets, speed limits of each section of town, such as Chetco avenue, and the school zone will be set by resolution.

Following enactment of the traffic ordinance, attention was given to the police code, defining all matters which will come under the police department. This ordinance will be read and enacted, probably at the next meeting of the council.
