Mobile X-Ray Unit Due In Brookings, Nov. 29 to Dec. 1

Under direction of the Oregon State Board of Health, co-operating with the T. B. and Health Association, a mobile X-Ray unit will be in Brookings, beginning at noon, Thursday, Nov. 29, and running through Saturday, Dec. 1, each day from noon to 8:00 p. m.

Arrangments have been made with Freeman's Market to hold the X-Ray examinations there on all days.

All people of the area, both old and young, are urged to attend, have their chest X-rayed, at no cost to themselves. By so doing each person will be able to determine whether or not they are afflicted with any chest disorders.

According to Bertha I Parkhurst, health education consultant, everyone 15 years and older should be given an examination each year, that tuberculosis can develop and have a good start toward tearing down a person's health in that time.

She said that this mobile X-ray unit can handle quite a number of people in a day, and that four days were being given this area that everyone might avail themselves of this opportunity.

A person needs but step up to the unit, no need for disrobing, except possibly an outer coat and all metallic objects in pockets which might appear in the picture.

People are urged to come, for there is no cost to the individual. People will be sent a card with a few weeks, and without cost a second X-ray will be taken if there appears to be anything the matter.

TOURIST BUSINESS THIRD IN OREGON GRAYSHEL TOLD ROTARY, ON TUES.

Charles Grayshel, president of Oregon Coast Association, gave the Tuesday address before the Rotary club, telling what the tourist dollar means to Oregon, and how it affects the economy of this community.

"Take for instance the case of Gordon Goetz, in Brookings. He operated a motel deal, and his profits have been re-invested in the area, to build the Goetz building, which building gave employment to several men, business to several local firms, all of which meant that the tourist dollar has helped Brookings—and that is a single case only," said Mr. Grayshel, in telling that more than 12,000 car gain (of those going south with California licenses) over last year. The number of cars passing along Hwy 101 and Brookings is staggering.

"Tourist travel is the third in money value of the industries of Oregon. The 1950 expenditures of tourists in Oregon per capita, per day was \$5.40, and the grand total ran close to one and a half millions.

"Any of us living on the coast must thank those fore-sighted men who in 1919 launched the road building program along Oregon coast. It would be surprising and quite revealing to study the tremendous growth of this travel.

"Since the average tourist is likely to spend more than \$5 a day, think what it will mean to all of Oregon if each of us were only to have them tarry a day or so longer. Acquaint all of them with sights they might like to view, go out of your way to show them of special sights
