

Wool Market In Confused State

Wool markets have been in a confused state for the past several month. With the exception of a few distressed lots the movement of wool to manufacturers has been nil. Wool handlers, however, are taking advantage of every opportunity to show their holdings to manufacturers, in the hopes that buying will be stimulated.

The Western Wool Storage warehouse is showing nearly a million pounds of wool to prospective eastern and western buyers on Nov. 30 and Dec. 1.

Display of wools will be in the Western warehouse at 1235 N. W. Irving Street, Portland. The showing dates just precede Oregon Wool Growers and the National Wool Growers annual convention which are being held at Portland Indications are that a large number of buyers will look at the wools and catalog them.

Manager, James M. Coon, specifically states in his invitation to the buyers that this is to be a showing only and not a sale as the owners of the wool prefer not to sell until the market is in a more stable condition.

Wools on display will be all grades and original bag. Growers participating in this display are

from all sections of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Portland is recognized the nation over as the second largest wool handling center in the United States. Nearly 15,000,000 lbs. of wool are consumed annually by both woolen and worsted manufacturers in the Portland area.
