Your community's progress, especially in the last six years, will be recorded and depicted by word and pictures, in a special edition of *The Pilot*, to be put in mails Thursday, December 27, when all phases of progress will be touched as much as material and space allow.

A section will be devoted to floriculture of this country, especially of this area; one section will tell of the phenomenal growth of the local schools, how the situation will be eventually remedied; of the growth in business of the town; of the lumber industry and its potential benefit to the area, especially southern Curry county.

In the past few years, the Pilot has accumulated quite a number of cuts, showing many facts which will look good in one edition, telling a story of progress—of forward movement.
