

### Seven Plagues Will Come 'Again'

The wrath of God poured out in the seven last plagues was the subject presented by Evangelist Manson Metcalf at the Bible Auditorium Sunday evening. He referred to the 10 Egyptian plagues and drew a striking parallel between them and the seven last plagues mentioned in Rev. 16.

The last warning message preceding the plagues is that the three angles of Rev. 14, revealing the judgment hour, calling all to fear God and to worship Him, and warning against receiving the Mark of the Beast.

The vangelist stated that when probation closes there will be a "time of trouble such as never was" when the seven vials of God's wrath will be poured upon those rejected His mercy. During that time the Lord will watch over His own and protect them as the Israelites of old were protected.

At that time it will be worth everything to be right with God,

for "what doth it profit a man if he gain the world and lose his own soul." The question was left with the listeners: "Are you Ready?"
