**Oregon Junior Vegetable Growers Win Four National Contest Awards**

OREGON junior vegetable growers were named winners of four state awards in the 1951 production-marketing contest of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association at the NJVGA concluded its seventeenth annual four-day convention at Cleveland, O., today.

The state-wide honors went to Violet K. Klobas, 16, daughter of Mr. Peter Klobas, Bend; Glen O. Klock, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orval Klock, Troutdale; Dwayne Everett Heikes, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Heikes, Cornelius, and John D. Prichard, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Prichard, Bend.

Each received a cash prize from the \$5,000 scholarship fund provided each year by A & P Food Stores as part of its nationwide program to encourage better production and marketing of vegetables by farm youth.

Also announced by Ralph Clark, Extension Horticulturist, Oregon State College, Corvallis, and state NJVGA chairman, was the awarding of the national championship and the top \$500 scholarship to Albert B. Bishop, 20-year-old grower of Guilford, Conn.

Miss Klobas' garden plot on her father's 80-acre Deschutes County farm netted her \$63.44. She marketed her produce with radio advertising, putting to good use her experience on the radio staff of

her high school. Violet is president of her local Future Homemakers of America group and a 4-H Club member of long standing.

Glenn Klock, a high school freshman, matches his gardening skill with recognized achievements in poultry and livestock growing and in forestry. He is vice president of his 4-H vegetable garden club and a leader in forestry and poultry organizations in his community. The vegetable plot that won him NJVGA honors netted him more than \$150.

Three acres of his parents' Washington County land and his own knowledge of vegetables

earned Heikes \$1,159 as well as NJVGA honors. The high school junior specialized in the growing of wax beans, and sold his crop to a frozen food concern. Dwayne is active in church work and in

John Prichard at 12 is one of the youngest NJVGA members, but is not too young to have an enviable four-year record in 4-H Club work and to net almost \$358 from his garden plot. The seventh grader ranks in the upper third of his class and has won acclaim as a junior Grange lecturer. He has claimed state and county awards in several phases of farming.
