

SMITH RIVER

Smith River Womens Club met Jan. 4, for its first meeting of the year at the community hall. Club President, Maude Luick was in charge of the business session. Reports were given by committee chairmen. The program was under direction of history and landmarks chairman, Mrs. Grace Hight, assisted by Mrs. May Crook and Mrs. Alyce Bolick. The program opened with a duet by Mrs. James Hight and Mrs. Eyo Mello Jr., singing two early-day ballads, "Seeing Nellie Home" and "Silver Threads Among the Gold." For encore they sang "She'll be Comin' round the Mountain," accompanied by Mrs. Lucille Lawn.

Mrs. Hight, member of California State Historical Society and charter member of Del Norte society, spent many hours in getting material together for the program for the afternoon. She told of the Old Indian Trails, wagon roads and early-day travels in this county. In 1853 when Daniel Haight and his father arrived in Smith River valley only Indian trails marked the way. Later came the horse and buggy days, freight wagons traveling to Altaville, now Low Divide road east of town. Many antiques were on display, carrying out the historical theme. Pictures of early-day settlers, Ace and Ellen Crook and Ann Riggs, in walnut frames hung on walls above the mantle with a collection of shaving mugs and mustache cups and saucers on the mantle. These were loaned by Mrs. Chester Crook.

The green and white checked cloth on the tea table was centered with ruby thumb-print corn potes filled with ivy and white candles in thumb print wine glasses.

A brass bucket was displayed, owned by Mrs. Emma Cooper. This was brought by her mother, Mrs. Wilson Baine, from New Hampshire over 80 years ago; was used for making jelly and jam in early days. Two old Tippecanoe bottles found under the

Westbrook Bros. store, when the floor was taken up for repairs, and many other antiques were admired by the group. Tea hostess was Mrs. Martha Ulrich, assisted by Mrs. Frances Westbrook and Mrs. Eunice Faris.
