Their advice to the young man would be something like this, "My boy, if you are willing to work hard and to sacrifice some of your youthful pleasures while preparing yourself; if you will never be satisfied with just getting by but always insisting on being as near perfection as possible; if you will endeavor to accumulate all the available knowledge that you are capable of absorbing and utilizing it—if you are willing to do this and moreover succeed in doing it, you will find yourself in a field where your services will always be in demand and where your labors will harvest their just reward."

The only people in this country who suffer from over-crowding are those who insist on being mediocre.

## Budget Committee Studies Finances

Elsewhere in this issue may be seen the 1952-53 budget for the local schools, as compiled by the budget committee and the school board, for publication for two issues. Budgeted to conduct the schools for the next fiscal year is \$227,632.50, of which \$158,934.99 must be raised by taxation.

With the school population at least double the previous year at the present time, and with prospects of the enrollment climbing perhaps another half, some believe the budget is set quite low. Certainly, people have found out, the school conditions are crowded more than was once expected. The crowded conditions will likely get much worse before the district will have valuation sufficient to bond for more buildings.

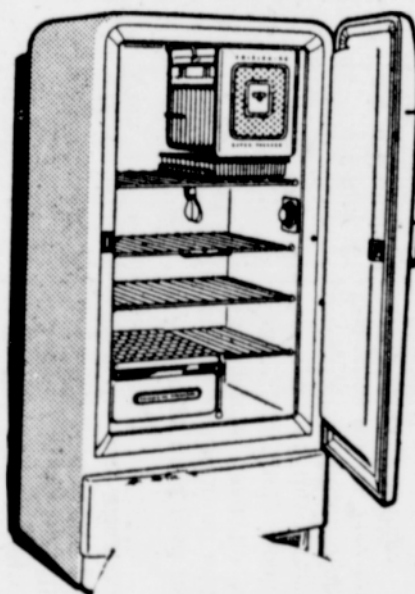
