### Eisenhowers Name Will Go On 'Oregon Ballot' In May!



The name of Dwight D. Eisenhower will appear as a candidate for president on the Oregon primary ballot as a result of the filing last Thursday of nominating petitions by the Oregon for Eisenhower committee. Action of the Oregon committee followed a telegraphic request from Henry

Cabot Lodge, Jr., campaign manager for Eisenhower, asking immediate filing of the nominating petition.

The petition filed carried only a few more than the number of signatures required to place the name of Eisenhower on the ballot. Mark Hatfield, executive secretary of the state Eisenhower group, explained that a later supplementary filing "will include signatures from every principal community of the state after all who wish have an opportunity to join in placing the name of D. D. Eisenhower before the voters of Oregon."

### Speaker Used Tale Of Titanic Disaster

Speaker at the church service last Sabbath at Seventh Day Adventist church was E. W. Brooks, principal of the Adventist school at Crescent City. His topic was: "The Titanic Disaster," telling how the largest vessel ever built up to that time, went down April 15, 1912, on her maiden voyage.

The ship was supposed to be unsinkable, yet she sank in two hours, carrying 1,513 persons to their watery deaths. The lesson for us is not to trust too much in our own works. Men in position to know warn of another world conflict and we should be prepared.

The Elijah message to go to all

the world in the last days is to turn the hearts of the fathers to their children. "The mothers hearts are in the right place already" as the speaker emphasized and the importance of the work of the church and parents for the children and youth that they may be saved. "We must work desperately to win the prize of eternal life for ourselves and our own families."
