

Film On India Is Billed For March 20

Lee Thomas, 33-year-old Purple Heart veteran of World War 2, has just returned to America from the country that inspired

him to become a minister of the gospel. From India, where he had spent 13 months in a hospital from wounds suffered when an ammunition train he commanded, was blown up by saboteurs, he saw the need for spreading the gospel to the world.

Thomas returned to India in 1951 to conduct evangelistic meetings under auspices of "Youth for Christ." His world tour included many countries of Asia and of Europe.

"India's Famine," a documental colored sound film, on social, economical and spiritual conditions of India, has been produced by the evangelist, bringing a true account of that famine-stricken county. Acclaimed by many as the most informative film ever presented to the American public, this film will be shown at the high school gym, March 20, at 8 p. m. Thomas has written a stirring report in his book, "India's Rendezvous with Time," which soon will be published.

and Hans is promised a good chance of having 20-20 eyesight again.

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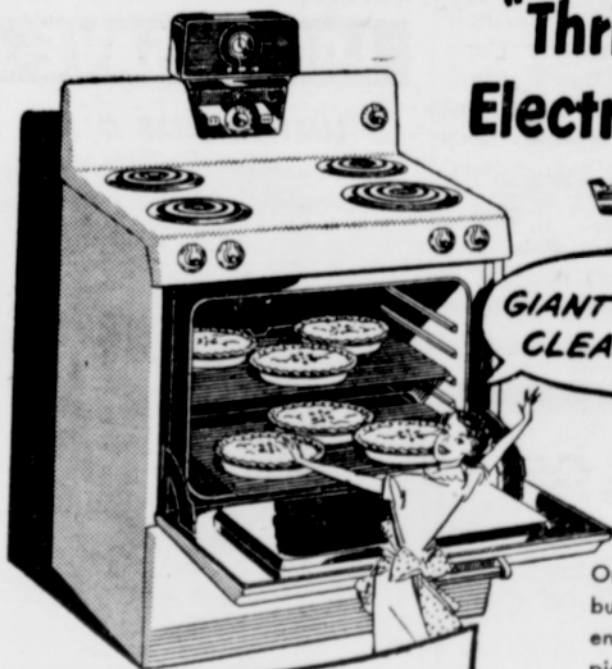


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
