The trio, composed of Miss Betty-Jean Hagen, violinist, William Hossack, cellist, and Joan Rowland, pianist, will be the first of its kind to be presented in the local concert series as well as the first Sunday afternoon concert of the association. The ensemble is a newly-formed one that made its first highly successful tour in the spring of 1951. Their present tour takes them to more than 60 engagements in which they present a program of wide variety and interest, with trios, solos, and duos scored for their instruments.

Joan Rowland, pianist, is a native of Toronto. Although she is only 21, she has concertized extensively for 10 years, is a veteran of sixteen orchestral engagements, and made her debut in New York in 1949 with a recital that received much critical enthusiasm.

Betty-Jean Hagen, violinist, is also in her early 20s, whose musical achievements belie her years. As winner of the Naumberg Award, the only Canadian so honored, she made her debut recital in New York in Town Hall in November, 1950. She is the winner of numerous awards including the 1951 Eaton graduation prize from the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto and the Thibaud International Competition in Paris last June. She has fulfilled successfully engagements with the outstanding Canadian symphony orchestras and is a frequent performer of the networks of the Canadian Broadcasting Co.

William Howland, cellist, comes from a musical family that also boasts a pianist, a soprano, a violinist, and a harpist. While a student at the University of Toronto, Hossack was a member of the Toronto Philharmonic orchestra. He has appeared in recital in many Canadian cities and has played both as a soloist and as a member of many chamber music groups. Wherever he has been he has been warmly received.

Although a versatile musician, Hossack does not confine his activities entirely to the cello. With a bachelor's and master's degree in mathematics and physics, already to his credit, he is also working on a PhD in astronomy.
