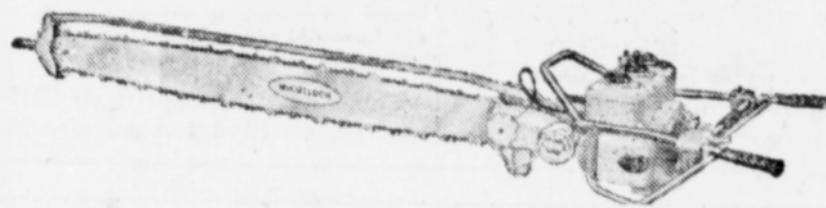

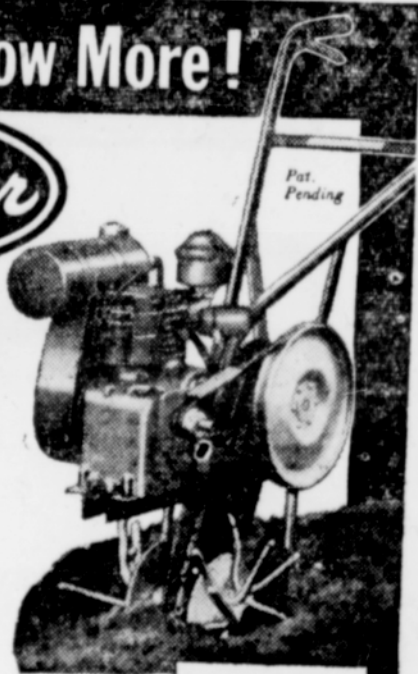

New Cake—Easy to Make



Betty Crocker's newest cake creation, Velvet-Crumb, is not only easy to put together but can be whipped up in a hurry. It is excellent to serve guests who drop in during the afternoon or youngsters looking for an afternoon snack. Main ingredient of the cake is biscuit mix. Velvet-Crumb is similar to the traditional butter cake—moist, tender, rich. Beating time is only 90 seconds, there is no creaming or sifting and it can be served while still warm. The recipe:

VELVET-CRUMB CAKE
Preheat oven to 350° (moderate). Grease generously and dust with biscuit mix one square pan, 8 x 8 x 2-in. (for double recipe use 13 x 9 x 2-in. pan.)

Mix thoroughly 1 1/2 cups biscuit mix
3/4 cup sugar
Then add 3 tbsp. soft high-grade shortening (all or part butter adds flavor)
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla
Stir together until ingredients are blended. Then beat vigorously for 1 minute.

Stir in gradually 1/2 cup milk. Beat for 1/2 minute

Pour into prepared pan. Bake about 30 minutes in moderate oven (350°). Cover with broiled topping while warm. Serve warm.

BROILED TOPPING

Mix 3 tbsp. butter or oil or shortening, melted & softened
1/2 cup brown sugar (packed in cup)
2 tbsp. cream or top milk
1/2 cup wheat flakes or coconut, if desired
1/4 cup chopped nuts

Place about 3 inches under broiler (low heat) until mixture bubbles and browns (3 to 5 minutes). Do not burn!
