Crop Certification Limited In Number

GOLD BEACH—Not all crops grown in Oregon are eligible for certification. In fact only certain ones can be certified, stated Cliff Jenkins, county agent. He suggests that growers who intend to plant crops for certification should check in his office for the latest information on certification.

As superior crop varieties are developed they may be added to the list of varieties that can be certified. The older varieties which the new ones will replace are then removed from the list. Advance notice of at least one year is given before a variety is dropped from the eligible list, explained Jenkins. Changes are made in the list each year as necessary.

This list of varieties is approved by the Oregon State College certification committee. This committee makes all the changes in adding to and removing varieties from the list.

The certification committee may or may not accept for certification varieties recommended for production in Oregon by the Oregon experiment station. Many crops produced in this state such as alsike clover and common ryegrass do not require a certification program.

Crop varieties developed in other states, Jenkins added, must be approved in Oregon for certification here. Not many crops are normally grown for certification in Curry county. New varieties added to the list for Oregon are Nomad Alfalfa; varieties that will no longer be certified in Oregon are Elgin and Orfred wheat. The growers interested in certified seed production are advised to visit the county extension office where a complete set of certification rules and application blanks are on file.

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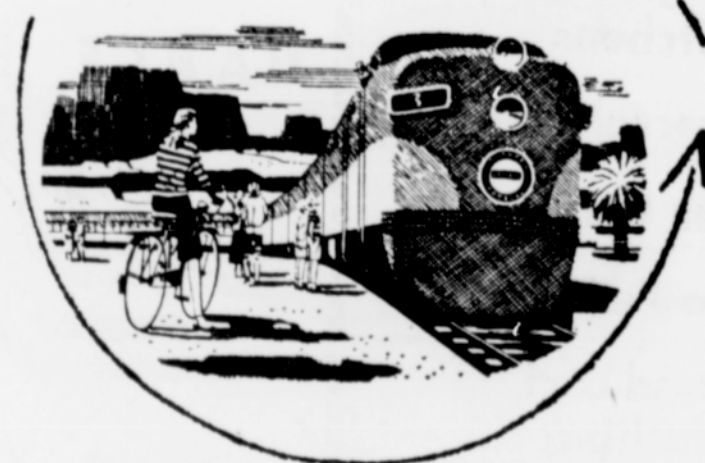
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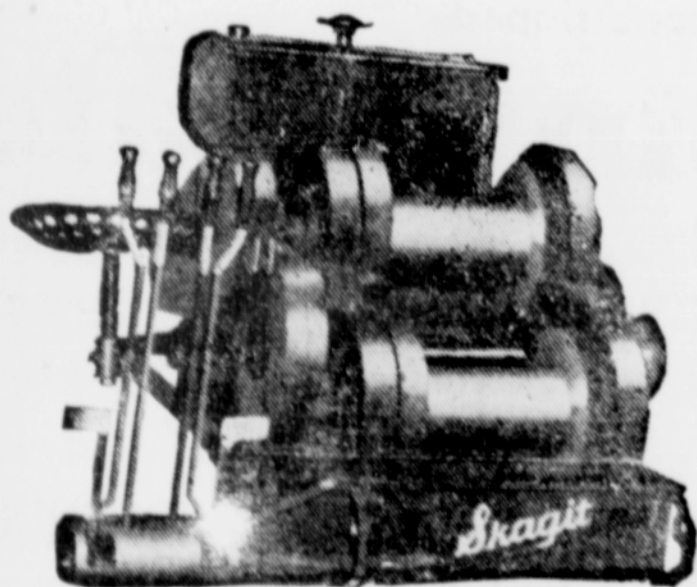


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
