## Public Will Discuss City Zoning Plan

Property owners along Hwy 101 north, from the Barbecue Lunch to Ransom Avenue, especially J. T. Jacobs, M. L. Morgan and Lee English, do not agree with the zoning committee's recommendation, and appeared before the city council Tuesday evening to raise objections. All want their property classified as commercial, for highway property would not be desirable as residence, the classification it now is being labeled.

Next Tuesday, at the eighth-grade room, a public hearing will be held on the zoning plan, and anyone who has objections to air, are asked and urged to be present. It was pointed out that no previous interest had been shown in the zoning, and but few had attended any of the meetings as advertised.

## Dimmicks Install Organ At Church

A Crowley "Organo," combination piano and electric organ of spinet type and design, was given to the Baptist Community church Sunday by Orville Dimmick and his sons, Robert and Les, as their part in the church building program now under way.

This instrument, the only one of its kind in the west, is a 1952 model which can give forth with music comparable to a pipe organ costing many thousands of dollars, or it may be used as a piano.

The Dimmicks, who wish to minimize their contribution, told the Pilot, that they felt that a musical instrument suitable for the new church, would not be purchased for lack of funds, once the church is under construction.

The instrument was delivered at the church last Sunday afternoon from the agency at Sacramento, having arrived Saturday from the east where it is manufactured.
