**Rabbits Profitable Business In County**

LANGLOIS—Up Sixes River, there thrives an industry that would be suitable for any small Curry county farm, and that is the production of rabbits.

This reporter had occasion to contact Frank Morris, Sr., who operates what is known as Frank's Small Stock farm. He has about 70 breeding does and around 350 growing commercial stock. He is quite enthusiastic about his project, which consists of pure bred New Zealand whites. He says he cannot begin to supply the local demand for fryer rabbits and that the outside market is unlimited.

He started on a small scale about three years ago and has grown to its present status. Said he could sell 1000 fryers a week right now if he had them. He expects to keep on expanding. Climatic conditions here seem to be suitable for production of rabbits, as there is no severe weather changes. Visitors are always welcome.
