Growers Asked To Attend Bulb Confab

GOLD BEACH—Lily growers from the Pacific northwest and buyers of lily bulbs will meet here Thursday and Friday, April 24 and 25, Cliff Jenkins told the Pilot representative, Wednesday. The program on April 24 is sponsored by the Curry County specialty crops committee and has been arranged for the purpose of presenting information pertaining to the clearance of the 1951 bulb crop through market channels. This meeting will be held in the circuit court room, at the court house, beginning at 10 a. m.

Production estimates and market requirements for 1952 in addition to presenting information pertaining to the 4-point program will be presented. This 4-point program, initiated for stabilization of the lily industry will include: 1, establishment of crop reporting service; 2 official car and field inspection; 3, the uniform sales agreement being recommended for use of lily growers in the marketing of the 1952 crop. 4, the initiation of the produce dealers act similar to the one in operation in California.

All growers from all sections of the county are urged to be on hand for these discussions.
