

### SMITH RIVER

Jasper James, 63, life-long resident of Smith River Indian Reservation, was instantly killed on Monday when struck by a tree in a woods accident.

James had been falling trees, working with his partner, Frank Moorehead for Hamilton Bros. Logging Co., about two miles east of Crescent City. The tree hit a sapling, striking and killing Mr. James.

He was born at Smith River Dec. 28, 1888, is survived by three children, Jasper Jr., Lila Russ, and Leonard, all of this place and eight grandchildren. Funeral services were held Wednesday after-

noon at 2 o'clock from Wier's Mortuary, Crescent City. Interment was in the family plot in the Smith River Indian cemetery.
