## Three Dead From Car-Truck Wreck Near Lake Earl

SMITH RIVER—A collision of an automobile and empty logging truck, 4½ miles north of Crescent City, Sunday night about 10 on Hwy 101 took the lives of a man and his two step-children.

Emmett Brown, 36, and step-son, Bruce Smallwood, 11, and Charlotte 6, of Lake Earl were killed when their automobile collided with a truck. Brown and Bruce were killed instantly. The girl was rushed by ambulance to Seaside hospital, but died Monday morning about 6:00.

Operator of the truck, Forest Vaughn, 28, of Lake Earl, escaped injury but was taken to the hospital for treatment of shock.

Reports say that Brown was going home after having visited his wife and infant at the hospital that evening. No other details could be learned at the time.

The accident is under investigation by Coroner Wier and Hwy Patrolmen. Brown leaves besides his widow and infant, two brothers, Bernie of Crescent City and Chester of Modesto, and a half-brother, James Hamilton of Crescent City.

## Brookings Will Go To DST, Sunday

By action of the city council, at request of the Brookings C. of C., Brookings will go on daylight savings time, Sunday, May 11. In response to a petition by the citizens, due to the closeness of the state line, it was decided to take this action. The change will become effective at 2 a.m. Sunday.

What this will do to the remainder of the county is not as yet determined. The local citizenry look at it in this manner: the radio programs are on daylight time. Many men, living here and working in California, or vice-versa, have difficulty in co-ordinating times.

Rev. Fr. Denman, pastor of the Catholic church, who has a schedule at Gold Beach and Port Orford, announces that due to change in time, services here on all Sundays, except the first Sunday of the month, will continue to be at 8 a. m. standard time, or 9 a. m. DST. This is necessary to enable him to maintain his present schedule. On the first Sunday services will be at 11 a. m. standard time, or 12, on DST.

The schools, however, will remain on standard time, since only three weeks remain, the Pilot was told, Wednesday.
