It was quite a sight, last Saturday, to watch the huge crowd at the plywood plant, attending at the dedication ceremonies. There is a score or more of estimates of the number, but most of them settle for about 2000 people at the plant during the afternoon. At any rate parking space in that huge area was at a premium.

More than a thousand were at Don's Cliff House to the Smorgasbord in the evening, which was an invitational affair. With this in mind, the two thousand estimate of the afternoon seems to be somewhere about correct. Brookings, except at a lily blossom parade, never saw any more people at one time.

It was also remarkable how the visitors thrilled at the rapid growth of the area, which they believe to be one of the most stable in the whole state of Oregon, especially along the coast. Marshall Dana, who has a summer home here, to prove his love and loyalty of the community, recited a few facts he knew of southwestern Oregon at his dedication address.

H. E. Tensler, president of the Northwest Plywood and Door Sales Company, told the listeners that better products and big production on the part of this area would always assure its future. A "better product always sells against any competition."

Establishment of the plywood plant here is another step in the future this area always had, and is entitled to. However, the plywood, while it is huge, does not represent the entire economy of the area. This community has plenty more to offer in way of industry and business.

One Quinalt, Wash., man told me that he was trying to sell his business in Washington and to get located here as soon as possible. He says this area offers what
