

### Festival Enjoyed At Ophir Grange

GOLD BEACH—A beautifully decorated stage of greenery and rhododendrons featuring a map of the world and the theme "Today's Homemaker Builds Tomorrow's World," provided the setting at the Ophir Grange hall when 175 women, men and children assembled for Curry county's annual Homemakers' Festival, last Wednesday, May 7.

Exhibits from nine extension units featured slipper chairs, and other articles which have resulted from five years of home extension in Curry County. Thirty-five women modeled beautiful wool dresses made in the better dress workshop. Miss Wanda Gossage, county extension agent, described each dress as the women displayed them on the stage.

Fourteen 4-H girls also participated in the style review, wearing dresses they had made this year.

Miss Lucy Lane, clothing specialist, brought greetings from Oregon State College and installed the new county home extension committee. Mrs. Alice Walker, present chairman, presided and gave special recognition to 4-H leaders and Mrs. Pauline Carpenter, county candidate for Oregon Mother, by presenting them with corsages.

Luncheon was served at noon in the basement of the hall by the Ophir Home Economics Club.

Special recognition was given the Ophir unit for the best table decoration and to the Port Orford Young Homemakers for the best scrap book.

The afternoon program brought an inspiring report from Mrs. Charles Jensen on her experiences with Wilbur and Judy at National 4-H Club Congress. Miss Myra Marlow of Port Orford and Geo. Wasson of Gold Beach, presented enjoyable musical numbers.

Dr. James Millar concluded the festival with a talk on "Tasks of the Modern Family." A lecturer and director of the Good Citizenship Foundation of Oregon, Dr. Millar brought many worthwhile thoughts on how Today's Family could better face the current big problems of the world.

A radio program of this festival will be heard over KCRE on Friday, May 16.

Several hundred thousand gallons of water were drained from the reservoir of Brookings Water Co., Tuesday evening, when a delivery panel, belonging to Richardson Pipe and Supply Co., hit a hydrant next to Matot Co.

The panel, parked on the south end of the building, could have driven away without incident, but the driver decided to back up, and turn. Not seeing the hydrant, he turned into it, breaking the main to cause a gusher. Before any of the water company employees, who had already gone home at the moment, could find a turn-off valve, many of the gardens across the street were practically washed out.

Josephine Apartments, and the Harvey building, directly across the street, were practically surrounded by water.

Wednesday many homes were without water until the main had been repaired.
