Buses Will Run Monday, May 19, Strike Is Settled

Radio news, Sunday evening, stated that agreement had been reached between the Pacific Greyhound Company and the striking bus drivers, and service on the coast route, and in the seven western states, which had been affected, would be restored on Monday, May 19, thus ending a paralyzing strike which had been existing since March 1.

A compromise had been adjusted, the news stated, saying the drivers would be given a 5 1/2-day-week immediately and the full demand of a five-day week would be reached later. No further details were given.

Highway 101, from Eureka to Portland, not served by any mode of transportation except by Greyhound, was worst hit of possibly the entire territory coming under the strike.
