Mrs. Kirk are long-time residents of that place and have received many honors as pioneers. He is a retired judge of The Dalles.

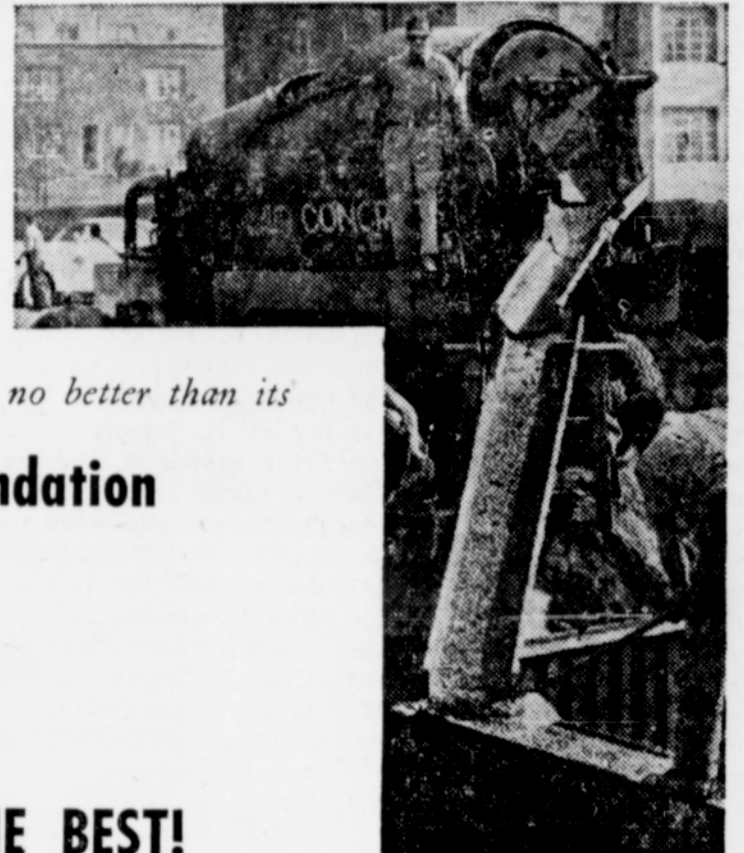
