

Dr. Barnard Joy Honored For His 'Superior Service'

Friends of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Joy in this area may or may not have seen the article which appeared in Friday's Journal, telling the honors bestowed upon their son, Barnard, for superior service. The article:

The agriculture department on Thursday honored an official stationed at Portland and an Ashland native, presenting them silver medals for superior service.

The recognitions went to Dr. Barnard Joy, formerly of Ashland and now assistant to the administrator of the agricultural research administration, and to Bert W. Whitlock, officer in charge and chairman of the Pacific Coast board of grain supervisors at Portland.

Whitlock's award was made in absentia but Dr. Joy received his medal from Agriculture Secretary Charles F. Brannan at a ceremony at which President Truman was the speaker. The department made 87 service awards.

Dr. Joy was recognized for his work in organizing and directing the national marketing research workshops held during the past three summers at leading mid-western universities, while Whitlock was cited for his work in the grain post.

The Ashland man is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert C. Joy, now living at Harbor, and is a brother of Richard Joy of Ashland and Mrs. Elizabeth J. Prideaux of Lyons and Miss Adena Joy of San Francisco.

His agricultural interest began as a school boy—when he was active in 4-H club affairs—and continued at Oregon State College, where he won his bachelor's degree in 1930 and was active in debating.

After college, Joy went to Kingston, N. Y., where he directed 4-H club activities until 1935 when he was transferred to Washington. He has worked since with the agriculture department in several capacities and during the World War 2 was national director of the recruitment of farm labor.

In addition to his duties as assistant to the research administrator, Dr. Joy is executive secretary of the agricultural research policy board and in private life

GOLD BEACH—Installation of a Linotype at Typo-Print, Monday, marks an era in the business career of W. D. Sibley, long-time employe of the Curry County Reporter, who ventured on his own moer than three years ago.

The rise of the Typo-Print is typical of the rise of many American business firms, from a small beginning to one which now taxes the physical strength of its owner, Wes, who has passed quite a number of summers along the way.

With a small press in his garage, this new business has grown until now it occupies a shop on the highway at the south edge of town. Equipment in way of presses and type have been added more often than the owner was ready to pay for them, but was forced through necessity. Now, to assist in the composition of type so necessary to any shop, a typesetting machine has been added.

Right at the moment all the equipment that would be needed to start a newspaper would be a press of sufficient size for that purpose.

The ballots for the primaries were printed at the Typo-Print, which had to use the big press at the Pilot at Brookings on the Republican ticket. At present the county fair books and the high school annual are requiring attention of this rapidly-growing new county business.
