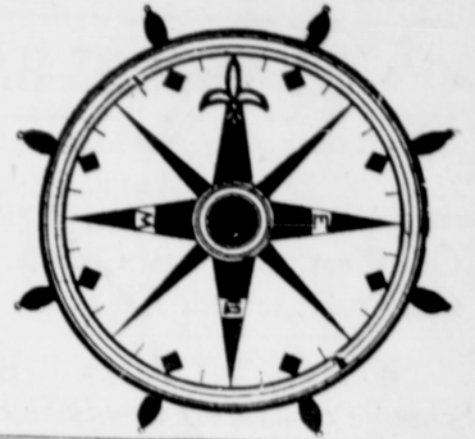

Weather Bureau Head Visits Here

J. C. Smith, meteorologist in charge of the western region of the United States, with headquarters at Salt Lake City, was a brief visitor in Brookings Tuesday morning en route south to Los Angeles and other California points.

Once located at Portland and later at Boeing Field, Seattle, Mr. Smith has been in the weather bureau work for about 40 years. His retirement will come later this year.

While here he inspected the site for the new station which will be manned by Mrs. Dewey Akers and Ben Kerns, at the seashore. He pointed out the importance of this station in the airway weather map every six hours, and estimated that Brookings observations were among the most important, except, perhaps, those from storm centers in Alaska or McKenzie River regions.

New Garage Seeks Agency 'Wishes'

At noon the free barbecue will be served at the park, and the afternoon will be open to the two baseball games and the flower show at the high school gym.
