

### Bandon Topped Brookings Sunday In Double-Header, Here, 11 to 1 and 2 to 1

With plenty of big-names of baseball afield for Bandon Sunday did not deter the Brookings Beavers from giving battle, despite the loss of a double-header, to give fans a pre-view of the class of baseball they can expect this summer. Ad Liska was effective, like he used to be for the Portland Beavers, and won the first game 11-1. Ad Liska, of former Portland Beaver fame, had an easy time in the opener, limiting Brookings to three hits, a double by Wally Maciel in the third, a home run by Frank Burdell in the sixth and a triple by Bill Darnell as lead-off man in the seventh. Darnell was left stranded as Liska retired the next three in order.

Wally Maciey started on the mound for the Beavers and pitched one-hit ball for three innings but the Millers exploded in the fourth for five runs on two singles, an error, a 3-run homer by Chuck DeAutremont and a solo homer by Jim Scott.

Bandon annexed another four in the fifth. Jim Sinovic opened with a hit, stole second. Ray Stratton scored him with a single. Another hit by Joe Tom then proved it wasn't Wally's day and Keith Johnson came in as relief. Johnson promptly walked Lee Shinn to populate the bases. Manager Bill Burgher then flied deep to left with Stratton scoring. DeAutremont sacrificed Tom and

Shinn ahead. Both scored on Clayton's single. The Millers added a final run in the seventh on two walks, an infield out and Clayton's second hit, giving him four RBIs for the game.

The closeness of the "second" game proved to the large opening day crowd that the Brookings Beavers can and will play good ball. Bob Astin for Brookings and Bill Hanauska gave a fine mound performances as one could wish.

Bandon scored first on Sinovic's hit, steal of second and Stratton's single, and in the second on what proved to be the winning run. DeAutremont lead off with a base hit to left. Clayton flied to right. Scott went down on strikes for the second out but DeAutremont tallied as Sinovic's grounder went through Meister at second for an error and an unearned run.

The Beavers' lone counter, although somewhat tainted came in the second. Bill Darnell, as lead-off, beat out a dribbler by the box and advanced to second as Joe Tom's wide throw got by Clayton. Maciel drove in Darnell with a hit to center but the big threat ended there as Phil Parsons forced Maciel at second and Jacobson and Peterson were infield outs. Hanauska scattered four Beaver hits the rest of the way.
