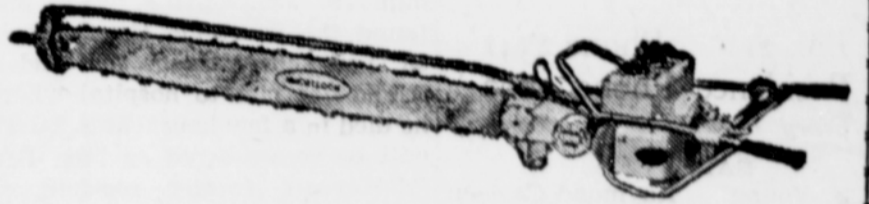
Over the week-end Mr. Root spent many hours training the new observes, and relief observers who will aid with some of the observations.
