City Building Code Enacted By Council Last Tuesday Eve.

Building Code Ordinance, No. 20, was passed by the city council June 3, and was made effective as of that date.

The code requires that: No structure or part of a structure shall hereafter be built, altered, repaired, or shall an individual sewage disposal system, or an individual water supply system be constructed until a building permit therefore has been granted.

Application for a building permit shall be filed by the owner or his agent with the building official upon a form provided for the purpose and giving such information as the building official shall require. Such application shall be accompanied by two complete sets of plans and specifications including plot plans showing the relationship of the proposed building to abutting property lines and to buildings.

O. D. Arp was appointed by the City Council as building official, which will include the duties of zoning officer and sanitary inspector. Mr. Arp will be on duty at the city hall from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. on week days except Saturdays when he will be on duty from 9 a. m. to noon.

Baseball Fans Will See New Players

Vic Lapiner, promising 17-year-old University of Southern California freshman pitcher, reported last week and will start one of the games.

Jim Nierman, who pitched and played first base for Brookings last year, reported Monday evening. Jim, now a sophomore at Oregon State, had five wins and no losses in pitching for his college JV team this season.

Chuck Fisk, regular shortstop from OSC varsity, this year, may be another player on hand Sunday.

Report has it that the Roseburg club suffered a double shutout defeat at the hands of Coos-Bay-North Bend last week. The Beavers are determined to hand the Chiefs at least one more loss this Sunday and thereby get Brookings into the "win" column.

Last Rites Tuesday For J. A. Bronson

Funeral services were held at Baptist Community church Tuesday afternoon at 2 for James Arthur Bronson, 77, who died at 4 P. M., Friday at Gold Beach hospital where he had been since the first part of April. Interment was at the Bollinger plot at William James Ward cemetery.

Born May 21, 1875, at Burleigh, Ont., Can., he had no known living relatives. He came to Brookings with Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Bollinger in 1933 from Bonners Ferry, Idaho, where the two became acquainted while working for the U. S. Forest Service.

Mr. Bronson owned the property directly across Pioneer Road from the Bollinger home, which he sold to Mr. and Mrs. Gran some time ago. Mr. Bronson was not one to tell much of his past, and little was known of him, even by the Bollingers, who said he was one of the best friends they ever had.
