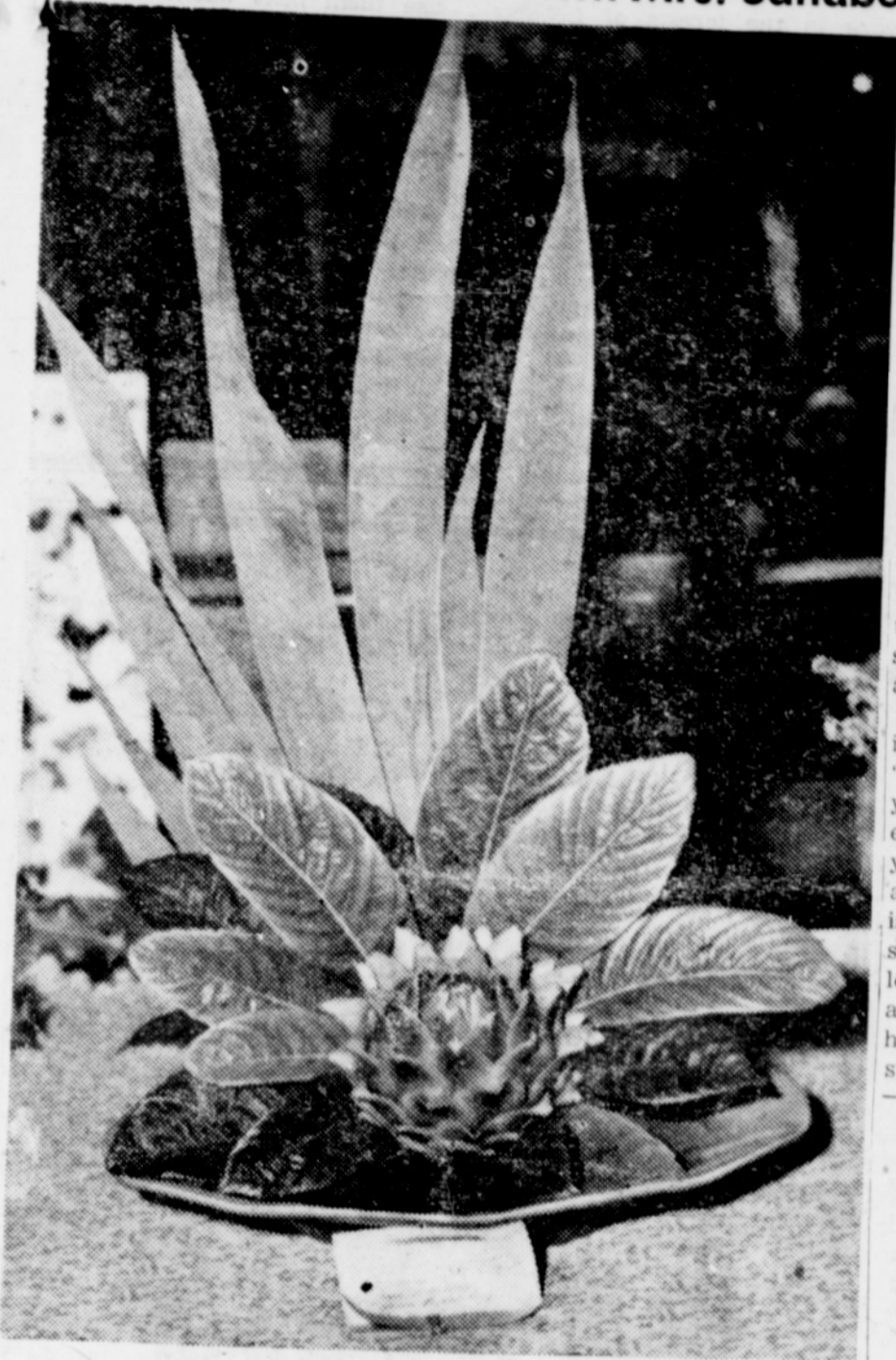


Winning Prizes Habit With Mrs. Sandbo

G. W. Milford Was Speaker Thursday At Joint Meeting

G. W. Milford of Rivers End and Red Bluff, Calif., was principal speaker last Thursday evening at a joint meeting of the Gold Beach and Brookings Rotary clubs. The meeting was held at the youth center of the Episcopal church.
