Scholarship Given For College Study

The Oregon Wildlife Federation has received a \$900 grant from the National Wildlife Federation to provide scholarships for selected elementary teachers to a conservation workshop conducted this summer by the Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland. The financial aid was announced by F. Ross Brown of Albany, regional director of the national organization and president of the Oregon federation.

The Albany conservation leader said similar grants for projects of outstanding merit were awarded this year in 23 other states.

Sponsored in each case by a state organization affiliated with the national federation, the approved projects included teacher workshops in 13 states, in youth camps in four states, wildlife research in three states, and miscellaneous activities such as pollution-control campaigns in four states.

Money for the grant-in-aids, as well as for other activities of the National Wildlife Federation, is secured through the distribution of sheets of wildlife poster stamps. The stamps, full-color reproductions of paintings by leading nature artists, have been issued annually by the federation since 1938 and interested person send in small contributions in return for the stamps.

Report Made Of District Conclave To Rotary Club

Sam Hall, Homer Kessler and Earl Breuer, members of Brookings Rotary club, who attended the district conclave at Coos Bay last Friday and Saturday, reported to the local club, Tuesday, on the various meetings each had attended. All were emphatic in the way Rotary International had of spreading its philosophy of life from the top circles to the individual members over the world.

"Rotary is a way of life, and is designed to bring about an understanding of the people of all nations where Rotary flourishes," Sam Hall said in beginning. "The more I attend Rotary meetings, such as the one at Coos Bay, I understand more fully what Rotary is trying to do. I was impressed by a statement made by the president of the Portland Rotary club about the peons of Mexico which he had seen while on his way to the International Convention at Mexico City.

"Those apparent poverty-stricken people seem more happy than we do, we, with all our comforts and luxuries. It should not be the policy of this country to revolutionize the people of others nations—merely to understand all their problems.

"I recall, continued Mr. Hall, "how the Arabs in north Africa, apparently poverty-stricken, had a happiness about them which we

do not have in this country." Homer Kessler told of meeting the new district governor of this district, and that he had promised to be in Brookings early in September, to pay his official visit. This new governor, only 32, and the youngest in all Rotary International, has plenty to offer the Rotarians all over the district. It is amazing the personality this young man has, and his capacity to grasp all situations.
