

Dry Spell Ended By Wed. Rain

Local weather observers, during the recent hot and exceedingly dry spell, learned while phoning the local weather reports to Medford, that a storm was hanging off the coast of Washington and was due to "slap" Oregon coast sometime Tuesday night or Wednesday morning. The Medford station personnel said: "You'll soon see," when the local observers had a doubt.

"The storm will be almost spent by the time it reaches the California line, but again it might be able to pick up momentum and really lash the coast with plenty of moisture.

Almost promptly at 4 a. m. P. S. T. Wednesday, drizzle came to the area, with but small amount of moisture falling, and with it coming 15 degrees drop in temperatures.

The relative humidity, that factor which determines the amount of time may be spent in the woods has changed considerably since the mist which fell early Wednesday.

Special interest is being stirred

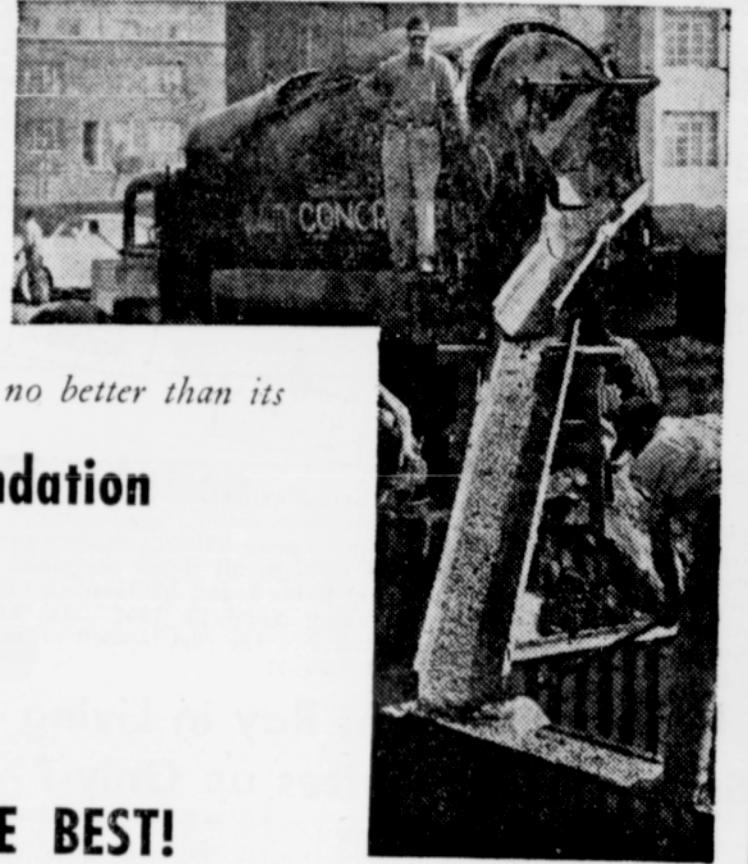
up this year by advent of the Chetco Wranglers into the entertainment picture of the fair. These riders hope to make this fair one which the county never will forget.
