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### Ellsworth Assures His Constituents

Practically as a last-minute decision, and certainly with no fan-fare, Harris Ellsworth and three from the district office of the army engineers at Portland, came to Brookings last Wednesday noon for a two-hour stay, and to assure local citizens that he had not forgotten the local harbor situation, although he could offer little hope of any actual work being done until after the Korean war was at an end. Assuring local people, too, was Colonel Lipscomb, district engineer, who in his southern drawl, said, "You gentlemen certainly have shown me that youah need is heah, and I personally am giving it my deepest study in the coming months."

One must say of Ellsworth that he remembers his district and the people who have sent him to Washington. In a hostile congress, he certainly has had little opportunity to really show what he is capable of doing. Ellsworth's honesty, his sincereness, his earnest efforts will not be forgotten by his constituents, as long as the Pilot is able to record them. The Pilot, on occasions, has not agreed with some of his ideas, but certainly the Pilot admires any man who will take a stand, and who will defend that stand in face of defeat.

### Stevenson Has Bosses' Approval

Elsewhere in this issue, Clifford P. Rowe, of Forest Grove, in his column: "For What It's Worth," stated that the Democrats had nominated the "best man" for candidate. To this the Pilot will take exception, but can offer no particular proof, except some reasoning.

In those states where primaries had been held prior to the Democratic convention, Kefauver had a tremendous edge. In the convention, on the first couple of ballots, he showed the popular appeal. However, the moment Harry S. Truman landed at Chicago, the picture changed, and immediately. Why?

Rowe's argument that Stevenson had no taint of the Democratic machine. Perhaps not, but it seems to the Pilot that the Democratic party machine was deathly afraid of Kefauver.

Nomination of Sparkman was a move which the party bosses felt would hold the southern Democrats in line. However, his nomination has an opposite re-action, especially among the negro vote.

Even with Eisenhower and his popular appeal, the Republican party has no cinch in winning the election this fall. But with Kefauver as the standard bearer, the job would have been far more difficult, and probably impossible. The Democrats are entrenched.

### Curry County Fair Will Be Better

Curry County Fair soon will be with us. This year, with Chetco Wranglers heading the entertainment committee, much more is assured in way of attraction than at any previous fair. The Wranglers, themselves, have popular appeal, and will attract many themselves.

Most of the Wranglers look at the whole situation in this manner: Rodeos, unless they are in a class comparable to those shown at Pendleton, and elsewhere people would not be interested. Yet, on the other hand, in this timber country with everyone interested in logging operations, a timber show, where many local outfits may compete, will draw crowds of partisan spectators.

The fair board has expanded many of the classifications and more prizes are offered, especially among the youth of the county.

All this points to a greater fair, to a more popular fair, with a lot more competition from all sections of the county.
