Brookings Rotary Club To Welcome District Governor Next Tuesday

The Rotary Club of Brookings on Tuesday, September 9 will be host to Milan D. Smith, Governor of the 154th District of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 44 Rotary Clubs in Oregon and southwestern Washington. He will confer with President Earl Breuer, Secretary Lynn O. Hampton and other local officers on Rotary administration and service activities.

Mr. Smith is a church, business and civic leader in Oregon, and is a member of the Rotary Club of Pendleton. He is one of the 207 District Governors who are supervising the activities of some 7600 Rotary Clubs which have a membership of 360,000 business and professional executives in 83 countries and geographical regions throughout the world.

Wherever Rotary Clubs are located, their activities are similar to those of Rotary Club of Brookings because they are based on the same general objectives, developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community-betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions, and fostering the advancement of

good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world.

Each year, this world-wide service organization continues to grow in numbers and in strength. During the fiscal year, for example 219 new Rotary Clubs were organized in 32 countries of North, South and Central America, Europe, Asia, Africa and the Islands of the Pacific.

625 Pupils Enrolled For Fall Term

The Brookings-Harbor schools began their fall term Tuesday morning at 7:45 for the high school and morning shift, and 12:45 for the afternoon shift. The

The previous registration taken early this summer was not accurate as a forecast of the number who would attend as quite a number of pupils were not registered early and were on hand Tuesday morning.

Registration at the close of Wednesday night was as follows:

First grade, morning shift 37; 2nd, 29; 3rd, 31; 4th, 38; 5th, 28; 6th, 27; 7th, 22; 8th, 31.

Afternoon shift 1st grade, 33; 2nd, 34; 3rd, 26; 4th, 31; 5th, 33; 6th, 29; 7th, 29; 8th, 20.

Total for the morning shift was 243 with 235 for the afternoon, making a grand total for the elementary school 478.

For the high school 9th grade, 52; 10th, 37; 11th 37; 12th 21.

Total for the number of students in high school is 147, and for the entire school to date: 625.

High school enrollment is somewhat less than was expected. However some 25 pupils have not enrolled who are known to be in the community. It is to be hoped that they enroll as soon as possible.

District No. 17 and the school administration has decided to observe strictly the law that a child may only be excused for personal illness or illness in the home which makes attendance impossible, and requires according to Chapter 572, Oregon School Law, 1951, that children between the ages of 7 and 18 are required to attend, during the entire school term, the public full time school in which the child resides.

In other words, resident children are required to attend the Brookings-Harbor school, or the Adventist school, for elementary pupils only.

It is to be noted that most of the classe are up to maximum enrollments, with the situation being somewhat critical in the first and second grades.

Work To Start Immediately On New Chetco Community Public Library

Actual work on the site and on the new Chetco Community Public Library will start immediately, according to Mrs. Erma Rice, president of the Library Association. The first jobs will be surveying the plot, at the corner of Redwood and Alder streets, one block east from the new Catholic church, and completing working drawings of the proposed structure.

According to a letter received by the Association from the Federal Surplus Property Administrator, upon receipt of architects plans, a contract will be drawn up and the deed to the property will be placed in escrow for delivery when the building is completed. Contract will call for the building to be completed within two years from date of contract.

The plot is about 150 feet square with streets on two sides and an alley on the third side. It is one of the most desirable building sites in Brookings. Tentative plans call for an initial structure approximately 24x48 feet, adaptable to extension, and conforms with plans advised by the state 2x4's on a concrete slab with low

eaves are specified. Plans are being completed by Roy Weideman, local architect.

With such encouraging news regarding the acquisition of the land, greater impetus is expected in getting the plant into operation. A house to house canvas, under the direction of Mrs. Ruth Bathiany has been very successful in adding to the building fund. Several organizations and businesses have made appreciated contributions in money, materials, labor and use of equipment, with many business houses still to be contacted.

The Library Association is incorporated under the State laws and the Library Board have adopted new by-laws opening membership into the association to the community at large. Regular memberships are \$2.50 per year, associate membership \$5.00 and life membership \$1000.00. Mrs. Myrtle Schaal, Harbor, is secretary of the board.
